U. S. HAS STILL VERY LONG LEAD

England Drew Closer to Finland by Hill and Baker.

Antwerp, Aug. 19.—The total scores in the athletic events—track and field—at the finish of today's program in the Olympic Stadium, were as follows:

The scores for England, Holland and Belgium represent three, two and one points on the three-way today. The United States and Italian teams which finished fourth and fifth in this event were not entitled to any points under the scoring rules.

English runners today dethroned the United States star mile runner, Joie Ray, of Illinois A. C., in the 1,500 metre race of the Olympic games. It was the first time that a British foot race of the seventh Olympiad, being just a little short of the thrills of the running of the 80 metres race on Saturday.

They scored impressively two firsts, a second, and a sixth place, for a point score total of 16, one less than the United States contestants, who won one first, two thirds, and one fifth for 17 points. United States made a good showing, all the four sprinters, Paddock, Los Angeles, Kisey, San Francisco; Murchison, New York; Woodring, Meadowbrook Club, Philadelphia, and Smith, in the 200 metres semi-finals, while the quarter-milers, Shea, U.S. Navy; Meredith, New York A.C., and Schiller, Los Angeles A.C., and Emory, Chicago A.A., won places in the quarter finals. Shea featured in his heat by winning from Rudd, the South African star, in a driving finish.

The United States pole vaulters likewise came thru their elimination trials without difficulty, but in the final trial
