FAILURE OF OWNERS OF THE "LOWELL THOMAS EXPLORER" TO PAY WAGES TO CREW—GOVERNMENT ACTION

Has the minister's attention been brought to the situation in Montreal in which the ship, the Lowell Thomas Explorer, which is carrying cargo between Canadian ports on the seaway, which is registered under Philippine registry and which is operated by Philippine seamen, is tied up in that city by a court order because the company has failed to pay its crew members their wages for February and March, despite the fact that the company—and Canada—is a signatory to the ITF wage agreement? If the minister is aware of this, what does his department intend to do about it?
