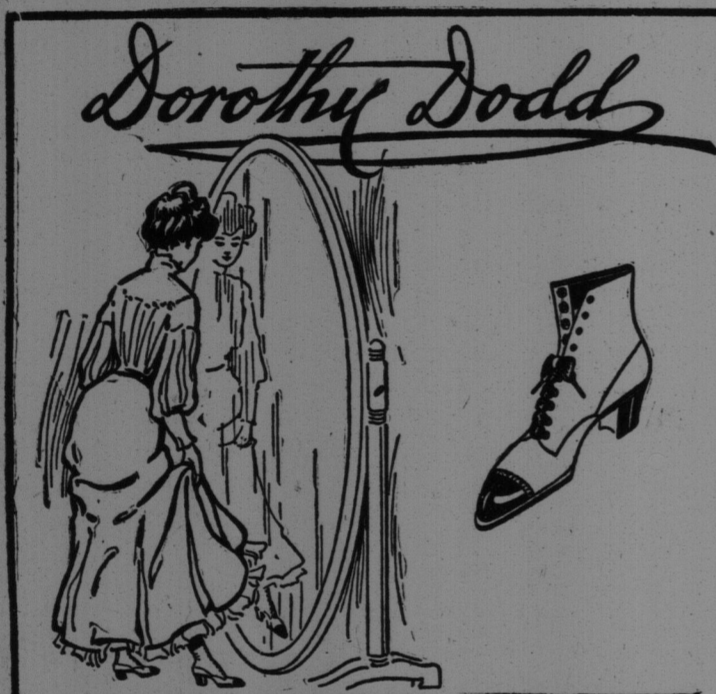

James Sherry, who had a bad wound in the back of his head, seemed reluctant to testify against the prisoner, and when sworn denied having struck the first blow.

Patrolman Perry was sworn and testified as to the hour and circumstances of the arrest and O'Brien was remanded until he can procure witnesses.
