CRITICISM OF SOCIAL FEATURES OF MARITIME TRADE BOARD MEETING

(Chatham World.)

Students and Smoking

In an article on the effects of smoking on college students in the August issue of The Popular Science Monthly, Dr. George L. Meylin, director of the gymnasium of Columbia University, finds that college students who acquired the smoking habit before entering college are about eight months older at entrance than the non-smokers. Three factors are probably responsible for this difference in age: (a) all scientists who have studied the physiological effects of tobacco upon man and animals are agreed that it has a depressing influence upon the heart and circulation, also, that anything which interferes with the vigor of the circulation has a retarding effect upon upon growth. It is therefore possible that smoking may retard both physical and mental development; (b) the age event is the time when most boys begin to smoke, if for any reason a boy is older than the average when he enters college, there is more than an even chance that he will have acquired the smoking habit in the secondary school; and (c) the type of student who is primarily interested in social life and athletics is found in secondary schools as well as in colleges; three out of four of such students smoke, and as they are usually graded low in their studies, these facts would account for a higher average age among entering freshmen who are smokers.

WHY QUEBEC BRIDGE WILL BE GREATER THAN ANY IN WORLD

Tenders for the construction and erection of the Quebec bridge will be received by the department of railways and canal up to October 1st next, and it is expected that tenders will be received from a number of English as well as Canadian firms. The immensity of the new bridge looks at 68,800 lbs. per square inch.

Test pieces of similar chords for the new bridge broke at 68,800 lbs. per square inch.

The new chords are therefore more than five times as strong as the old ones. According to the tests the old chords would break under a pressure of 22,634,000 lbs. and the new ones under a pressure of 116,701,000 lbs.
