NEWSPAPER MEN GUESTS AT CAMP ON NORTH SHORE

To Spend Some Days in N. B. After Meetings in Quebec

QUEBEC, Oct. 8.—During the past two days meetings have been held here of the boards of directors of the Canadian Press, and the Canadian Daily Newspaper Association.

On invitation of the publishers of the Saint John Telegraph-Journal and Evening Times-Star, a number of the directors of the Canadian Press and the Canadian Daily Newspaper Association, will leave here tomorrow night for New Brunswick big game territory, forty miles from a railroad.

Those who comprise the party include J. R. Woods, Calgary Herald, president of the Canadian Press; H. Macklin, Manitoba Free Press, honorary president of the Canadian Press; Hon. Frank Carrel, Quebec Chronicle-Telegraph, president of the C. D. N. A.; Arthur Partridge, Toronto, manager of the C. D. N. A.; E. J. Archibald, Montreal Star, H. B. Burgoyne, St. Catharines Standard, W. J. Motz, Kitchener News Record; George E. Scroggie, Toronto Mail & Empire; George Macdonald, Eastern Superintendent of the Canadian Press, T. F. Drummond, general manager of the N. B. Publishing Co. will conduct the party to Newcastle, N. B., and will be joined there by J. D. McKenna, president, and Howard P. Robinson, vice-president of the company.

TO DRIVE ALONG MIRAMICHI

The party will be conducted from Newcastle on Sunday afternoon. They will be driven in automobiles along the Miramichi River to Renou River camp, situated on the Renou River and will be entertained there for some days by the publishers of Saint John newspapers. There will be a big game hunt. Afterwards they will motor through sections of New Brunswick in order that they may get an idea of the natural beauty of the province. In addition to the above named, James H. Crockett of the Fredericton Gleaner, and Don Creighton of Newcastle will join the party.

The past half year's accumulation of business was disposed of at today's annual meeting of the board of directors of the Canadian Daily Newspaper Association held at the Chateau Frontenac.

Several reports were presented, all of which showed that the affairs of the Association were in a satisfactory condition.

TO MEET IN TORONTO.

It was decided that the annual meeting of the Canadian Daily Newspaper Association will be held at Toronto in April next.

The directors of the C. D. N. A. and also the directors of the Canadian Press, who held their semi-annual meeting yesterday, were entertained at luncheon today by Hon. Frank Carrel, Quebec Chronicle-Telegraph.

This evening, the three local members of the Canadian Press, L'Evenement, Le Soleil and the Chronicle-Telegraph gave a banquet for the visiting publishers.

Tomorrow night there is to be a reunion of the surviving members of the Canadian Press expedition to the Western Front in 1918.

Following tomorrow night's function some of the visiting publishers will leave for the Renou River (N.B.) Camp of F. F. B. Mason, of the Montreal Daily Star, V. E. Morrill, of the Sherbrooke Record was elected to the board of directors.

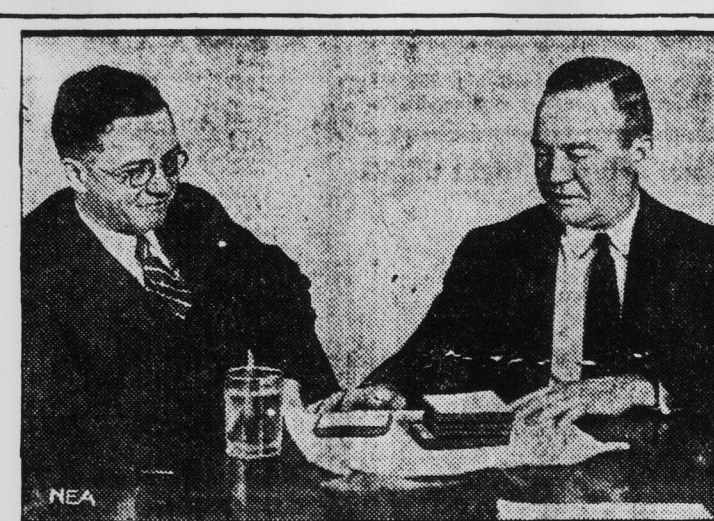

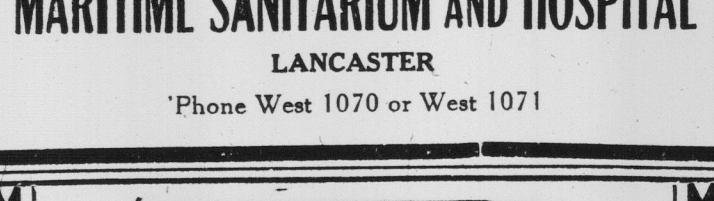
