

FRICTON LIABLE TO DEVELOP OVER CONTROL OF BASKETBALL

M. P. B. AND NEW ASSOCIATION MAY COLLIDE

Said Proposed Governing Body Must Have Consent of A. A. U. Branch

IT HAS been reported about town that friction was liable to develop between the M. P. B. of the A. A. U. of C. and the proposed New Brunswick Basketball Association, a meeting for the formation of which has been called for November 13 in this city. The M. P. B. has nominal jurisdiction over basketball as well as other sports for which no special organization has been formed and it was said that a New Brunswick basketball association could not be formed without the consent of the M. P. B., which consent, it was said, had not been granted.

If the new basketball association is formed it was said that authority to operate that body would, he supposed, from the M. P. B. as a matter of form and if that was not granted the plans of the association would be carried out anyway.

The formation of the association is being made at the request of the Eastern Canadian Association so that a winner in the various classes in New Brunswick could be declared and thus made eligible for any play-offs. It was pointed out by one sport follower that if such an organization had been formed in this province for the control of amateur basketball, such as the one in Nova Scotia and the N. B. State association for the control of that sport, the middle regarding the play-off for the New Brunswick title would not have occurred.

It is recalled that last year the M. P. B. authorized the formation of a New Brunswick Basketball Association but for some reason it was not carried through.

WANDERERS SERIES NEXT TEST FOR U.N.B.

Team Leaves Tomorrow For Halifax For First Game—Victory Was Lucky

FREDERICTON, N. B., Nov. 5.—University of New Brunswick has passed the first milestone on its journey towards what rugby honors are to come to the Red and Blacks from the 1926 season activities, having captured the western section of the Maritime Intercollegiate League by beating the Mount Allison University team 3 to 0 here yesterday in the second game of their series," says the Daily Gleaner on its sports page today.

"With that victory—lucky it is true—there is certain to go the provincial rugby championship of New Brunswick inasmuch as Mount A., although beaten 6 to 5 and 3 to 0 by U. N. B., is certain to win the Nova Scotia Rugby League championship—a series in which U. N. B. have not taken part because of other engagements. U. N. B. also becomes the team to play the winners of the eastern section, composed of the Nova Scotia colleges, for the Maritime Intercollegiate championship.

"But that game cannot take place until after the middle of November, and meanwhile the U. N. B. team have an engagement to play at Halifax. Wanderers a series of home and home games which may be for the McCurdy Cup, but whether for any trophy or not bids fair to attract more attention than any rugby games that have been played in the Maritime Provinces for many years.

"Only a few days remain until that series starts, but meanwhile it is possible that some attempt will be made to make over the U. N. B. backfield which was disappointing because of inaccuracy in passing and fumbled at critical junctures in yesterday's games.

The U. N. B. team are, this afternoon, having their only practice before leaving tomorrow for Halifax to meet the Wanderers in the first of the home and home games.

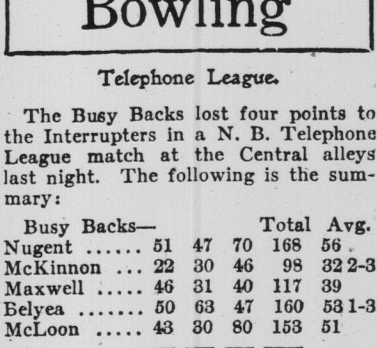
