BRITAIN ACCEPTS

Caillaux Offer Said To Have Reached At Canadian Border; Two Men Are Held By U. S. Officials 5415

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—An attempt to smuggle diamonds valued at \$100,000 across the Canadian border came to light yesterday, when a customs official searching the baggage of two men, who had been arrested at Syracuse, N. Y. found \$55,000 worth of gems concealed in the hollowed handle of a shoe brush.

The men, who said they were Henry Margulies, of Albany, N. Y. and Abraham Treppel, a book-keeper of New York City, were arrested a few days ago, at Rouses Point, when customs officials found \$45,000 of gems hidden in their baggage. They were released on \$12,000 bail, but customs inspectors made a further search of the baggage discovering the additional cache.
