LONDON, Aug. 25.—M. Caillaux, the French Finance Minister, resumed his debt conversation with Chancellor of the Exchequer Churchill early this afternoon, after conferring with Montagu Norman, governor of the Bank of England, at the French Embassy.

200 ARE HOMELESS IN MONTREAL FIRE

Apartment House, 20 Dwellings and 2 Other Buildings Burn—Woman Hurt.

MONTREAL, Aug. 25.—It was unofficially estimated this morning that more than half a million dollars' damage was caused by last night's fire. Besides 23 buildings, completely destroyed, many others suffered extensively from water, smoke and sparks.
