Newcastle, Feb. 17—A smoldering mass of ruins is all that remains of the beautiful St. Mary's Academy, a fire having razed the building during the night. Fire was discovered in the building at 9 p. m., on Saturday and immediately an alarm was sent in. At the first sign of fire the sisters marshalled the boarders and had them removed to the new school which was only recently completed, but they saved very few of their effects as the flames spread with such rapidity and it is very fortunate that there was no loss of life, due to the cool headedness of the mother superior in charge. The building was one of the most imposing in Newcastle and was built 26 years ago and was maintained by the congregation of St. Mary's church under the direction of the Congregation de Notre Dame. It was valued at about \$50,000, with only \$10,000 insurance.


