Lumber Business To Britain Unrestricted

Volume Limited Only by Amount of Tonnage Available, is Prediction—Smithers Makes Statement on G. T. P. to Shareholders.

Ottawa, March 21—Recent advice from Canadian mission in London is to the effect that the timber control will soon be lifted and Canadian lumbermen are advised by the mission to get in touch with the ordinary trade channels, as the volume of business will likely be limited only by the ocean tonnage available.

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT ON G. T. P.

London, March 21—(By Canadian Associated Press, cable)—A. W. Smithers, chairman of the Grand Trunk Railway at a shareholders' meeting today gave an exhaustive statement covering negotiations with the dominion government. He urged that the Grand Trunk Pacific should at all events be treated with the same consideration as the Canadian Northern. British investors should receive treatment consistent with the honor and interest of Canada.

The shareholders while emphatically endorsing all the chairman's statements were restrained in their observations, one speaker recommending that it would be best to keep their holdings at present.

THE MARKETS AT A GLANCE

There is a belief in certain sections of the steel and iron trade, and it seems to be fairly well founded, too, that the talk about price reductions coming is being carried on at too great length. It can have only one effect, that of holding back purchasing. There are firms today who would order one hundred tons of plate, for instance. They have the stock to guarantee. Instead of making it to let the mills have only twenty or so tons at a time, in the hope that at least a large portion of the order will get the benefit of whatever reductions may be made. It is also worth noting that as low as 2 1/2 per cent has been quoted at an American point of plate, April 1 large sized order of plate, April 1 they could apparently do it. This means something is liable to come in regard to a new schedule of prices.

The scrap metal market continues dead. Dealers apparently have not the heart to come out and batter down the price lists to any lower level, although they are showing considerable leniency in making a new schedule of prices.

Many of the machine tool dealers are now getting stocks that have been in the market for some time, owing to the "makings" of very heavy machines that were used primarily on certain contracts in gun work. Very large gaps in the market are being offered direct from the mills at a considerable reduction on the usual price, and as one of these machines is apt to be an \$8,000 undertaking, a discount of ten or fifteen per cent runs into some real money.

Although there is nothing to go by, the rumor persists that higher prices will be asked for drills, taps, reamers, etc.

The steamers Ozona, Philadelphia and Carib are all due here in the near future with sugar.

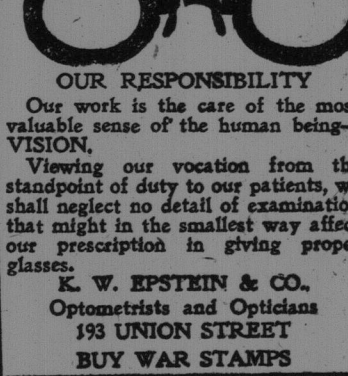
