WEIGHT-LIFTING

Carried Off the Honors by a Margin of 207 Pounds in Two Nights

Montreal, April 24—By lifting a total of 1,787 pounds in eight feats of strength, decided during the two nights' tournament at Sohmer Park, Hector De tournament at Sohmer Park, Hector Decarie won the honors by a margin of 297 pounds over Gendron; his nearest competitor. Decarie outlifted his opponents in the majority of the tests on both nights. Although beaten for the honors, Gendron who weighs only 145 pounds Gendron, who weighs only 145 pounds, being the smallest man in the contest, made even a more remarkable showing than the winner, who is a much larger than the winner, who is a much larger and more experienced man.

In the second feat Decarie established what is claimed a new world's record, raising a bar-bell weighing 150 pounds, eight times from the shoulder.

The exhibition given by Travis, the winner of the Brooklyn tournament, was more impressive than on the opening legit. Lying on his back he raised with his feet a piano with two men on it, and at the same time with his hands he lifted a bar-bell with three men on it, giving him a total lift of over 2,000
