WIFE'S THROAT CUT; AMERICAN IS HELD BY LONDON POLICE

London, Sept. 24.—Charles Henry Weston, formerly of Salem, Mass., is in jail at Richmond, a suburb of London, as the result of the death of his wife, who was found in their house with her throat cut, and who died while being taken to a hospital.

Mrs. Weston, it is alleged by the police, said before her death, that her husband had been inflicted by her husband. Neighbors, attracted by screams, found Mrs. Weston suffering from several gashes in the throat. Her husband was in the house at the time and he was taken to the police station.

Weston registered at the United States Consulate as an American citizen. Both he and his wife were popular in the American colony, where they were believed to live on the happiest terms.

Salem, Sept. 24.—Charles Henry Weston, reported under arrest in England, is

believed to be Charles Henry Weston, formerly of this city, the son of the late Henry Weston of the old-time leather firm of Charles Weston & Son.

Weston, who is about forty-five years of age, left Salem about twelve years ago for England, and a short time after arriving there married a widow, Mr. and Mrs. Weston came to Salem about four years ago, and at that time he attracted some attention by his peculiarities.

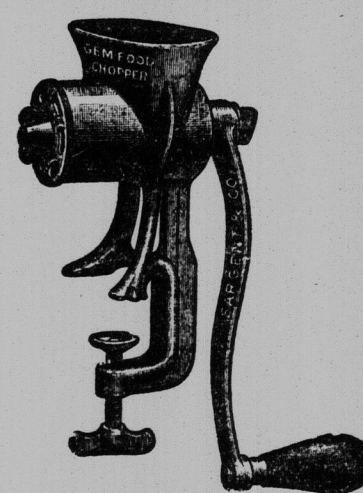

MARITIME PROVINCES' TRADE WITH BRITAIN

Moncton, N. B., Sept. 24.—That an organized effort should be made by business interests in the maritime provinces to place before the British public information regarding industries in the maritime provinces was urged at a meeting of the Moncton Board of Trade last night.

The secretary of the board was authorized to take up the situation with the department of trade and commerce, Ottawa and to correspond with the Maritime board of trade with a view to calling a special meeting of that organization to consider means of bringing the products of the maritime provinces to the attention of the United Kingdom.

It was suggested that a booklet should be distributed in the old country.

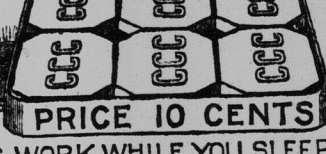
