CUBAN WOMEN ARE READY FOR EQUAL RIGHTS
Ten Official Congressional Themes Arranged; Suffrage, Protection of Home and Welfare on the Programme.
Havana, Cuba, Feb. 28.—(By Mail)—Cuban womanhood will be called to the colors soon for a campaign to secure equal rights. The opening gun will be fired at a national women's congress which is being organized by a committee from the National Federation of Feminine Associations, and although the date has not been fixed an extensive programme, consisting of ten official congressional themes, has been arranged. It follows:

Women's Rights, Constitutional reform, Moral and Physical Welfare of the Youth, Protection for the Cuban Home, Reformation of legislation affecting property rights of wives and children, Social Welfare, Study of arts and sciences, summer schools, instruction in civil rights, National and political equality.

Women's Work, Protective legislation for female workers and export mothers who also are breadwinners.

Women in Business, Their actual status and means of improving it. "Women on the Farm." Farm classes for women and means of instilling a love for flowers and the beautifying of homes.
