Barrie, April 16.—Barrie's Electric Light Department's profit of \$6,809 for 1992 is almost equalled by the surplus in the Waterworks Department, which amounts to \$5,498, nearly double that of 1921. This is due mainly to reduced operating expenses, particularly in fuel. Coal has been entirely displaced by electric power for general pumping, with an auxiliary gas engine as an emergency power for fire purposes. Since the plant was taken over by the town surpluses to the amount of \$32, 858 have been earned.

It crowded and overflowed the committee room and threw on the table seventeen hundred signed contracts for hydro, with eight hundred more ready to be signed as soon as the current is available, although only a quarter of the city has been canvassed.


