The Previous Suit

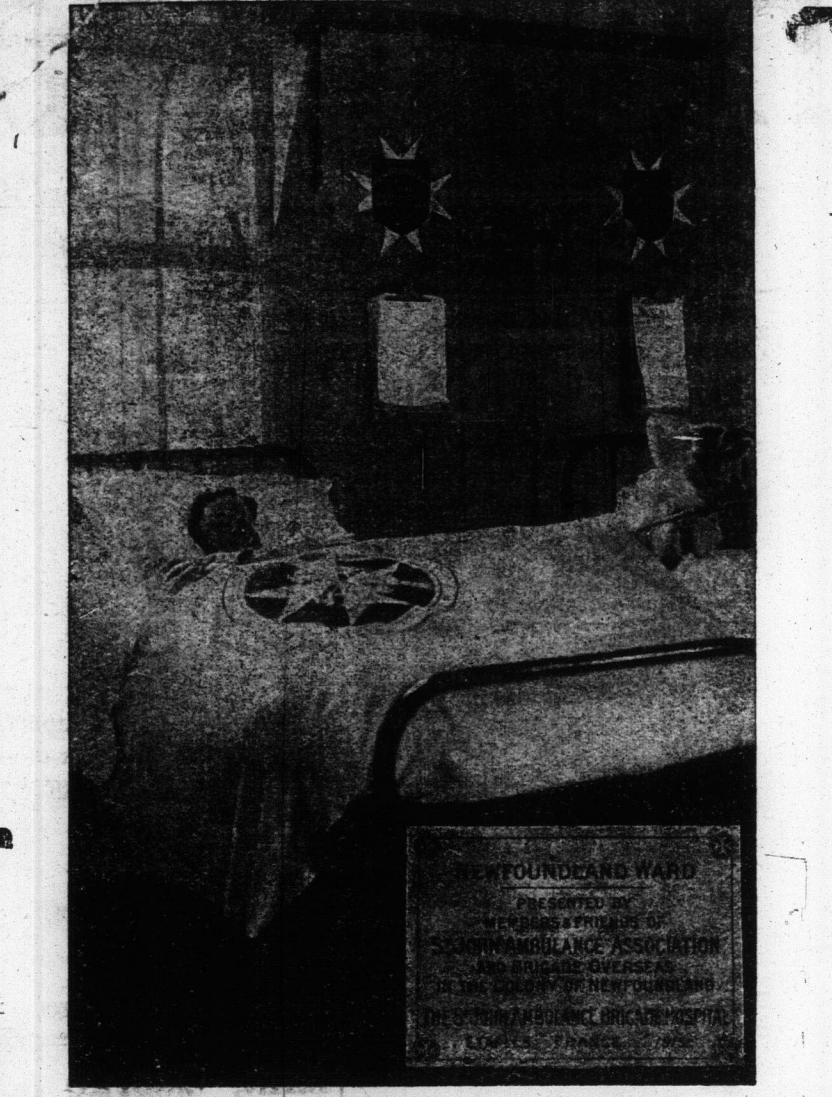

Britain Wins

The Appam Case

German Captors of Steamer Violated Neutrality Law, Says United States Federal Courts

Norfolk, July 29.—United States Federal Courts today not only decided that Britain is entitled to the Appam, which a German raider captured and took to Newport, but that the manner of bringing the Appam into the waters of the United States, as well as her presence in those waters, constitutes a violation of the neutrality of the United States; that she came in without bidding or permission; that she is here in violation of the law; that she is unable to leave for lack of a crew, which she cannot provide or augment without further violation of neutrality.

Now "up" to the U. S.

Washington, July 29.—The Federal Court's decision, holding for the British owners in the Appam case, confronts the United States Government with what to do with Lieut. Berg and his prize crew, which brought in the ship after one of the most thrilling captures in the sea history of the war. Generally speaking Lieutenant Berg and men are regarded as part of Germany's naval forces, and if that view were carried out to its conclusion they would have to be interned for the war with the crews of the two other German commerce raiders, Prinz Eitel Friedrich, and Kron Prinz Wilhelm, at the Norfolk Navy Yard.

NEWFOUNDLAND POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Canada, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radius of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray. Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.
