AN ODDFELLOW'S FUNERAL.

Yesterday afternoon at 1:30 a special L. E. & D. R. R. train chartered by the local Oddfellows, left for Wallaceburg. On board were some sixty local members, who were joined by thirty from the visiting Oddfellows honored by their presence. The obsequies of their late brother, Thomas Sudds, who lost his life by falling from a derrick. The funeral was one of the most largely attended ever seen in the town, the cortege comprising 132 rigs, besides the firemen and the lodge brethren on the grave. The services of the Oddfellows and Foresters were duly observed. After the funeral the brethren of the L. O. O. F. assembled in the Wallaceburg lodge room, where short addresses were delivered and hymns sung.

ONE HUNDRED YEARS OLD.

Last week was the centenary of the institution of the Church Missionary Society and in Holy Trinity yesterday afternoon Mr. Sudds preached two appropriate sermons on mission work. He showed how we were commanded to preach the gospel to all men and how lamentably we had failed to carry this out. The church missionary society, however, was making noble progress in the work, but there was much yet left to be done. It was estimated, he said, at the present time, that every hour 250 persons perished who had never heard of the real God or of a Saviour or who had even seen a missionary. The preacher was rather sad on those who could but would not give towards rescuing these people from their ignorance, misery and superstition.

Reid, of the Trading Stamp Company, will regret to hear that owing to an unfortunate combination of circumstances he was forced to close his establishment on Saturday evening. Had Mr. Reid done this a couple of months ago he might have saved for himself some \$500 or \$600, but in an effort to protect as far as possible the interests of his patrons he held out as long as possible. The action taken by the grocers in discontinuing the use of the stamps has been most for some time. The result has been that the demand for stamps has fallen off, while those who held them have in many cases combined together to make up the necessary hundred dollars and claim their premiums.
