JAMES COLLINS WAS SERIOUSLY INJURED

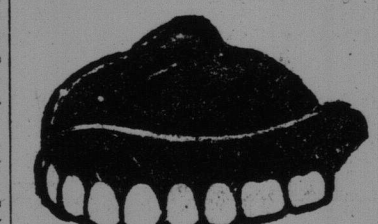
In an Accident at Hillyard's Yard This Forenoon. His Left Leg is Broken and Other Injuries Sustained—Recovery is Doubtful

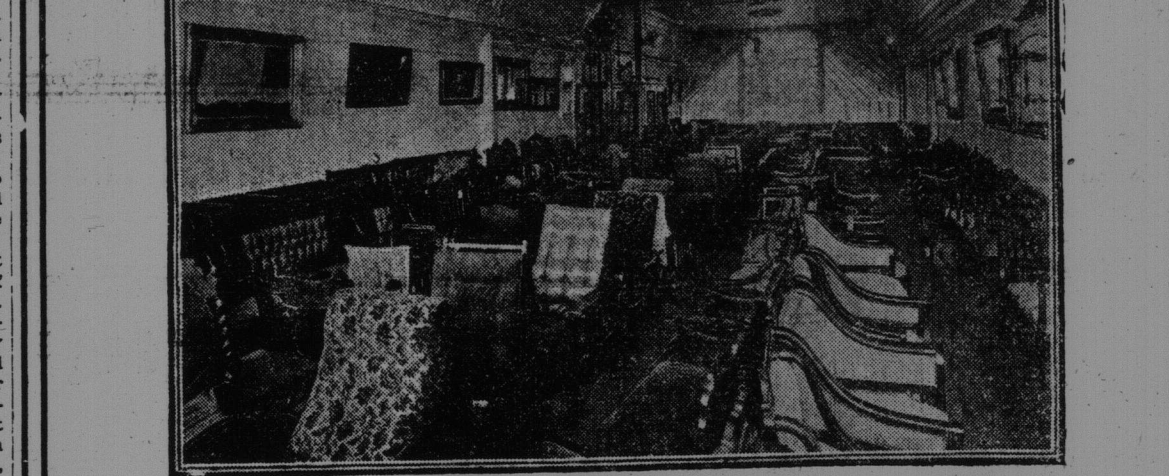
