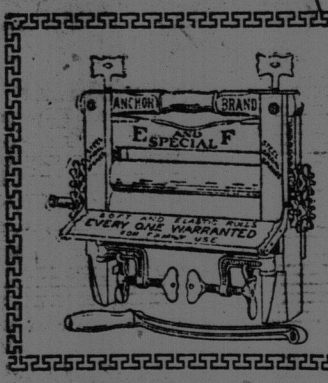

FRENCH AND SPANISH SHIPS DESTROY MOROCCAN TOWNS

Casa Blanca and Nearby Villages Shelled—Many Among the Moorish Troops Were Killed or Wounded—Casa Blanca Fort Replies

TANGIER, Aug. 6.—The French cruiser Gallie was bombarding the Moorish quarter of Casa Blanca and the neighborhood of the city when the last steamer, which had just arrived here left that port.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—A special despatch received here from Tangier today, describing the bombardment of Casa Blanca says the French cruiser Duchesne and the Spanish gunboat Don Alvaro de Bazan, participated with the Gallie in the bombardment of the villages surrounding Casa Blanca, which were destroyed by the fire of the warships.

MADRID, Aug. 6.—Foreign Minister Pichon and the Spanish ambassador here have agreed on the terms of a Franco-Spanish note informing the powers signatory of the Algerian convention, of the intention of France and Spain to keep in the terms of the convention, the situation after the landing of troops at Casa Blanca largely determining the subsequent measures to be taken by France and Spain.

BRITAIN TO BUILD A RAILROAD IN NIGERIA

LONDON, Aug. 6.—Speaking in the House of Commons yesterday, Winston Churchill, under-secretary of the Colonial Office, announced that the Government had decided to build four hundred miles of railroad in Northern Nigeria, from Maro, by way of Bida, Surgera and Zaria to Kano.
