ATTEMPT TO WRECK A TRAIN AT SPRINGHILL. Stones Found Wedged Between the Rails - Wedding at Moncton Today - Thieves Sentenced.

MONCTON, June 16.—A session of the justice of the peace court was held at 10 o'clock yesterday. His Honor, Judge Wells presiding. Fred and Courtenay Goodwin, charged with breaking and entering the store of Robert Freecott, at Bale Verte, were arraigned and pleaded guilty. His Honor after representing the prisoners, severely sentenced them to thirty days in jail. W. H. Chapman appeared for the Crown and A. J. Chapman for the defendants. An interesting wedding took place today, at noon, in St. George's Episcopal church, when Miss Emma McLeod, formerly of the Moncton schools teaching staff, was married to Mr. Frank Stebbins, representative of the Ontario Windmill and Pump Co. A number of rocks tightly wedged between the rails and plankings sufficient in size to have derailed a train were found yesterday at Church street crossing. Rev. minutes before the incoming Springhill accommodation was due to pass. A citizen who discovered the stones, evidently placed there by a maliciously inclined person, succeeded in extricating them with a good deal of difficulty just before the train arrived.

BERLIN, June 16.—Frauulin Peppi Weiss, Berlin's favorite music-hall star, who holds some such place in German music-hall as our own Miss Marie Lloyd of London, was fined \$50 today for assaulting a rival actress, Frauulin Madaline Wilden.

Frauulin Weiss, who testified that she was accustomed to pay a song writer as much as \$200 to compose her exclusive songs, heard that Frauulin Wilden was intending to mimic some of her most popular numbers. Meeting her at the home of the latter, she assailed at Haringdorf—the Brighton of Germany—Frauulin Weiss vented her wrath by scratching her rival's face with her fingernails. Frauulin Wilden presented a sadly dishevelled appearance.

Frauulin Weiss supplemented this physical punishment by some unambiguous references to her rival's lack of success. Frauulin Wilden's escort, being her fiancé, Frauulin Wagon's cavalier, like herself, emerged from the fray disgraced.

LONDON, June 15.—Miss Gertrude Wren, the first woman to win the Perle medal one of the most sought-after awards in the gift of the Pharmaceutical Society, is a bright-faced girl only 22 years of age, with clear, shining eyes and a high intellectual forehead. Since her success was announced on Saturday papers of congratulation from all parts of the country, Miss Wren resided at her home in Onslow Gardens, Muswell Hill, N.

How the girl chemist gained her success was told by Mrs. Wren in an interview. "Miss Wren," she said, "has been a student at the Pharmaceutical College since she was eighteen. She has worked very hard, for after leaving the college each evening at 5 she would read for several hours at home. Miss Wren is the first girl to be awarded the medal, but no doubt other girls will follow her now that a woman has once won it. It is not yet decided whether Miss Wren will turn her knowledge to professional work."

It was at a girls' high school in Camden Town that Miss Wren first conceived her studies in chemistry. But any is another study in which Miss Wren has taken a great interest, and some time ago she gained a silver medal for the sciences.

SKELETONS IN A CAVE. LONDON, June 16.—The skeletons of ten persons have been found in a cavern near the Severn Tunnel, on the Cam-mouthshire side.

MARRYING THE FAMILY. BERLIN, June 16.—A man named Niebhard, at Marburg, Germany, who was left a widower some years ago, married his wife's sister. She died last spring, and now he has married the mother of his two previous wives.

FATAL REFORMATION. PARIS, June 16.—Jacques Schlessel, a Paris workman, who has been ordered by the doctor to give up strong drink if he would preserve his health, drank a glass of water yesterday for the first time in ten years, and died on the spot.

ANARCHIST DETAILED TO KILL THE KAISER

Rome Newspaper Gives Prominence to Remarkable Story of Regicide Plot.

ROME, June 16.—The Tribuna publishes the following telegram from Bari: On May 12 two municipal guards conducted to the police station a young foreigner having no visible means of subsistence. He was identified as an anarchist, and was named Paul Nikolaus, of Charlottenburg, 25 years of age, engineer and sportsman. He was taken to the police station because the consular authorities could not ascertain the reason of his visit to Bari. Nikolaus declared that he was an anarchist, and was in Apulia on a certain mission. Owing to the suspicions of the authorities, he was put in prison, and inquiries were made. Yesterday in the presence of the examining magistrate and another police official, the prisoner made the following statement: "I am an anarchist, and left Bari to carry out an undertaking to kill a high person at the Imperial court who travelled in the emperor's suite when his majesty went for his Mediterranean cruise. "Another anarchist, a friend of mine, accompanied me to Ravenna. Here I was left. Having ascertained that the emperor was going to Apulia, I proceeded to Bari with every precaution in order to carry out my plans. "In the meantime, time was passing, and the money at my disposal began to diminish. Not understanding the Italian newspapers, the intelligence of the postponement of the visit only reached me after some delay, when I was no longer even able to provide myself with my daily necessities." Nikolaus was obliged to surrender to the police, he said, through starvation, hoping to be repatriated. He refused to give further details or to say by whom he was instructed to carry out the crime, or the identity of his proposed victim.

The Tribuna declares that there is reason to believe that Nikolaus intended to make an attempt on the emperor's life, but did not give full details, in order not to render his position more grave. He appears to be intelligent, and is very well educated.
