BRITISH SHIPMENTS.—From a Parliamentary report it appears, that the total number of vessels which entered the ports of the United Kingdom during the year 1837, was 146,191, with an aggregate burden of 14,025,200 tons, exhibiting an increase of 4,000 vessels, and 1,155,400 tons over the arrivals of the previous year. Of the arrivals, 48,100 vessels, with a burden of 2,315,800 tons, were from foreign ports, and 125,000 vessels, with a burden of 10,409,400 tons, were engaged in the coasting trade. Of the last number, a very considerable proportion must have been steam-vessels, which arrived at the ports between which they ply three or four times a week, and whose arrivals give an idea of the extent, frequency, and value of the intercourse existing, than of the number of vessels employed.
