

An indication of the nervousness of the commercial community over the situation is the fact that many insur-ance policies are being issued by an underwriting corporation against re-volution or hostilities in Mexico. The underwriters gave notice yesterday that after March 26, a clause in their policies would become operative war-ranting the holders against the cap-ture seizure or detention and the con-sequences thereof arising from riots or warlike operations, of all vessels trading in Mexico, together with their cargoes.
