RED CROSS STILL SUPPLIES COMFORTS TO SOLDIER PATIENTS

Meeting of N. B. Division of the Society Held Yesterday Afternoon in Red Cross Depot — Fredericton Represented—Excellent Reports Given by Conveners of Committees—Work of Various Provinces Described.

At an interesting meeting of the N. B. Division of the Canadian Red Cross Society a number of reports were given which showed continued activities of the organization. R. T. Hayes presided and the secretary's report was read by Miss Ethel Jarvis as follows:

Secretary's Report.

The past two months have shown a large amount of activity among the branches and the various committees formed to carry out our Peace Policy. All of our larger centres have grasped the meaning of the wonderful benefit it will mean to mankind to continue in the paths of unselfishness which were trodden in the days of the war. In a brief report I am unable to note all the branches are doing, but we hope before long that they will send us, either by representation or writing, frequent reports of their work.

St. Stephen has shown much activity, sending gifts to the County Hospital, St. Dunstan's Home for the Blind, Serbin Orphan fund, and assisting one of their own town girls to procure much needed treatment. St. George, too, is manifestly carrying on and has voted money to the care of the soldiers in the hospitals and is also preparing to make supplies for our Cottage Hospitals, and knitting socks for the soldiers who come to our shores.

Barnesville is contributing to the pleasure of the tubercular soldiers in East St. John. Moncton is assisting in the extension of their hospital beside the many other activities they have on hand, and Fredericton in addition to their other work, sent relief to St. Quentin. Parcels of socks and clothing have been received from East Florenceville, Upper Gasquetown, River Carlo, East St. John and St. John the Baptist circles.

Newcastle has sent \$100 towards their Miramichi and Mable Sackville is still at work. Two reports of our Peace Work and the continuation of our Soldier work have been requested from head office. One from Dr. Fitzgerald, the general secretary for the Advisory Board, and one from Mrs. Plamptre to be published in a bulletin. These were both compiled and sent. Two communications have been received from the United States. One

in reference to a Canadian soldier enlisting in U. S. and one in regard to a soldier enlisting here, but whose family were in the U. S. These were both referred to the Canadian Patriotic offices.

Letters have been received from Bathurst and Riverview. At Riverview place they are very anxious to receive more hospital equipment. Your secretary has urged the advisability of their having a chartered branch of the Red Cross in their district.

As the long looked for Bulletin arrived during the last two months your secretary, with the kind assistance of Mrs. Harold Lawrence, mailed several copies of these to each and every branch.

Your secretary also sent notifications to each county asking for representation on the lecture committee under the convener of Col. MacLaren. Letters were also sent to Mrs. Plamptre, Dr. Hattie and Dr. Hastings in connection with this committee.

Notices of appointment were also sent to members of the Progress and Activities Committee under the convener of Mrs. G. A. Kuhring. The largest report we have to make is the answer we made to the call for immediate relief to the stricken village of St. Quentin. Our report was made the headquarters for the collection of garments given by the citizens and we also sent generous supplies from our own stores. In all five shipments were made and consisted of 220 articles of bedding, 26 articles of men's clothing, 236 articles of children's clothing, 222 articles of women's clothing. Total 1,105.

Too much praise cannot be meted out to our convener, Mrs. E. T. Sturdee, who was at her post day after day to receive and pack the goods. In this she was assisted by the V. A. D's, by members of the packing committee, by individuals and by Mr. B. Allan.

Our thanks are also due to the many generous contributors to St. Paul's Needlework Guild, to the Old Ladies' Home, to the Women's Institute at Clifton and to the Duke of Rothesay Chapter of the L. O. D. E.

Our emergency fund has been depleted and I would like to see added to our committee an emergency convener who would take charge of such stores, and I would urge the provincial branches to make some of these garments for these emergencies which have been no less than three in the past eight months. What is most required are children's clothing, and it is so necessary to have them ready in store to ship in an hour's notice.

Lady Ashburnham who was present from the Fredericton Branch gave an excellent report of the work accomplished there which included comforts supplied to the D. S. C. R. at Fredericton, River Glade, to 6 large cases of supplies for St. Quentin and assistance rendered by the V. A. D. under the direction of Lady Ashburnham to the Salvation Army Drive, which amounted to \$875.

Miss Kate Stewart who is convener of the Junior Red Cross told of well-thought out plans to interest young people. The committee regretted that they could not arrange for health talks to be given in the Public Schools by the Victorian Order of Nurses, but Dr. Carter felt it could not be permitted.

Colonel Murray MacLaren reported for the lecture committee that they have in view a suitable travelling representative who would visit all Branches in the Province and form circles in new centres New York headquarters have been asked for literature which will be distributed.

C. B. Allan, treasurer, stated balance on hand \$6600 with credit at Toronto. For the Port Committee Mrs. Lawrence gave a detailed account of the splendid work of the Local Red Cross at the Rest Room under Mrs. Arthur Adams, the V. A. D's with Mrs. A. M. Rowan, convener, and other faithful workers. Mrs. Lawrence read a very appreciative letter from N. R. Deslauray, District Passenger Agent, of the C. P. R. stating that the utmost assistance had been given all officials in their work at the Port and praising the welcome accorded all women and children disembarking at the Port. The expenses had been \$1002 and over \$100 had been received in tips ranging from five cents to \$5.

For the Hospital Committee, Mrs. J. V. Anglin reported that since February 1914 has been expended for comforts at the East and West Side Hospitals and at River Glade, \$115 per

month is spent for tobacco and cigarettes. Mrs. Anglin gave an interesting talk on the various provincial methods of carrying on Red Cross Hospital work in Manitoba, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Quebec.

All felt that the first duty of the Red Cross is to care for the soldiers in hospitals. Mrs. Anglin commended the follow-up work of the Western divisions heartily, speaking of this fine convalescent home.

C. B. Allan read a clipping from a Newfoundland paper showing that in that Colony automobile drives for soldiers are furnished by individuals. A letter was read from River Glade asking if it would be possible for the Red Cross to furnish a recreation room in that institution and on motion it was decided to do this.

Mrs. Kuhring for the Progress and Activities committee gave a list of her committee and told of the plans for the September Exhibition at which it is proposed to have a Red Cross booth in connection with the Public Welfare exhibit. The Red Cross will also, it was decided yesterday, assist in this health demonstration work.

On motion it was decided to wire approval of the postponement of the Membership Campaign from this Autumn to next Spring.

Mrs. Lawrence on the Cottage Hospital Committee reported progress and R. T. Hayes gave an account of the Council meeting which he attended in May at Toronto.

STATUES TO WOMEN.

The unveiling of the statue to Nurse Cavell reminds us, says the London Morning Post, of the comparatively small number of women thus honored in the Metropolis. There is the one in Waterloo Place to Florence Nightingale; Elizabeth Fry is commemorated in a statue at the Old Bailey; there is a statue of Lady Henry Somerset in the Victoria Embankment Gardens; Mrs. Siddons is recalled by one at Paddington Green; and one of Dame Alice Owen stands in the hall of the almshouses at Islington that she founded. To Queen Victoria there

is a stately memorial outside Buckingham Palace. Queen Anne is recalled outside St. Paul's, at Queen Anne's Gate, and in Queen Square, Bloomsbury; there is a beautiful figure of Queen Alexandra in the grounds of the London Hospital; there is one of Queen Elizabeth at St. Dunstan's Fleet Street; and one, not far away, of Mary Stuart. It was to a nurse that the first statue of a woman commemorated was erected in this country—that at Walsall to the memory of the devoted Sister Dora, who fought the scourge of smallpox which devastated the Black Country in 1867.

THE NEW BANKRUPT COME INTO FORCE

The Following is a Summary of the New Law, Which Will Give Man a Fair Idea of Its Scope

(Reprinted, except as amended, from the Journal of Commerce.)

The following resume of the Bankruptcy Act has been prepared by N. C. Martin, chartered accountant, 73 King Street, Toronto, and secretary of the Canadian Paper Trade Association. It is an excellent summary of the salient features of the Act and will be read with interest by the business man who is too busy to wade through the Act in its entirety. The new Bankruptcy Act passed by the Dominion Parliament is to come into effect on the July 1 next. The Act applies to all corporations, with the exception of banks, railways, trust and insurance companies and to all persons earning less than fifteen hundred dollars per year.

It provides that an insolvent debtor may make to an "authorized trustee" an assignment of all his property for the general benefit of his creditors. It provides that a creditor, or several creditors together, having a claim of five hundred dollars or more, and knowing a debtor to be insolvent and unable to collect his account, may apply to the court to have the debtor adjudged a bankrupt. The circumstances of the case will be passed upon by the court. The court may dismiss the petition of the creditor, may stay the proceedings, or may grant an order, as the circumstances warrant.

It provides that a debtor who has made an assignment shall be known as "an assignor"; a debtor who has been forced into bankruptcy by his creditors shall be known as a "bankrupt".

It provides for the discharge of an honest debtor who has turned over his assets for the benefit of his creditors.

The Act is designed to provide a uniform law throughout the Dominion, to make proceedings quick and cheap, to abolish preferential credits, and to provide for the discharge of the honest debtor.

Trustees.

Trustees shall be known as "authorized trustees," and shall be appointed by the Governor-in-Council. All authorized trustees must furnish general bond before acting as such, and provide special bonds in each estate, to be relieved by vote of the creditors. The creditors pass from trustee to trustee, and shall vest in another.

On a receiving order being made against a debtor, the property of the debtor shall forthwith pass to, and vest in, the trustee named therein, and in case of change of trustee, shall pass from trustee to trustee, and shall vest in the trustee for the time being during his continuance in office without any conveyance, assignment or transfer of the property. Receiving orders shall take precedence of attachments, executions, etc., with certain exceptions in the case of New Brunswick.

A trustee may carry on the business of a debtor so far as may be necessary for the beneficial winding up of the estate, and may incur obligations and make advances for such purposes.

No trustee shall deposit any sum of money received by him as trustee into his private banking account. Trustees may receive the lease, or may disclaim same, and may assign the lease or sublet the premises for the unexpired term.

Rent is preferred in an amount not exceeding the value of the distrainable assets, and not exceeding three months' accrued due prior to the assignment, plus the cost of distress, of any.

Accelerated rent under lease shall rank upon the estate as an ordinary creditor, but not more than for three months.

Trustees shall have power to sell patented articles without being bound by any restrictions, such as may apply to ordinary traders.

Trustees may pay dividends promptly, not later than six months after the date of the assignment, or earlier, if required by the inspectors, and thereafter when sufficient money is on hand to pay 10 per cent.

Unclaimed dividends shall be deposited with the Minister of Finance. The remuneration of trustees is limited to 5 per cent. of the cash receipts. Inspectors are to be paid according to a scale, with their out-of-pocket expenses.

Any person who is not a trustee, and who represents himself to be such, or who is an authorized trustee, either before providing the bond required, or after providing the same, but at any time, while the said bond is not in force, or who exercises any of the powers of an authorized trustee, or, having been appointed an authorized trustee, fails to observe or to perform any of the provisions of the Act, or fails duly to do, observe or perform any act or duty which he may be ordered to do, observe or perform by the court, pursuant to any of the provisions of the Act, shall be guilty of an indictable offence, and liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, or to a term not exceeding two years' imprisonment, or to both such fine and such imprisonment.

Creditors.

A creditor who maliciously endeavors to force a debtor into bankruptcy shall be liable to a fine of one thousand dollars or two years' imprisonment, or both.

Secured creditors, in cases where the trustee elects to take over the security at the valuation placed upon it by the creditors, shall not be entitled as heretofore, to an extra 10 per cent.

A provision for ratifying compositions and compelling minority creditors to accept the will of the majority, providing the same is approved by the court.

Claims by husband or wife for wages, money or other property lent to the debtor shall not be entitled to claim upon the estate until all the creditors have been paid in full.

Claims for wages, exceeding three months, by father, son, daughter, mother, brother, sister, uncle or aunt shall not be allowed until all other claims have been paid.

No officer, director or shareholder of an insolvent corporation shall be entitled to claim wages exceeding
