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IMPORTANT QUERIES ANSWERED IN HOUSE

Premier Fleming Says Gould Told Him His Bankers Were Responsible and He Took His Word For It—T. J. Carter, M. P.'s Violation of Independence of Parliament Does Not Interest the Government.

Fredericton, April 7.—In the legislature yesterday Hon. Mr. Fleming, in answer to Mr. Dugal's inquiry, said: Q. 1.—Has the government or any member of the government made any use of the arrangement made by Lisman & Co. of New York, with the St. John & Quebec Railway Co., Ltd., for purchase and flotation of the second mortgage bond issue of \$1,000,000 per mile?

Q. 2.—In view of the fact that the Dominion government has appointed a commissioner to investigate the charges made by F. B. Carrel, M.P., in the house of commons, relating to the report of the engineer of the department of railways and canal works, which the double subsidy was paid the Southampton Railway Co., does the government of New Brunswick, having guaranteed bonds for the same railway to the extent of \$18,000,000, propose to be represented at the investigation?

Q. 3.—If so, what was the nature of the agreement and its carried out?

Q. 4.—Did any representative of Lisman & Co. interview the government or any member of it and give any assurance that they would take the second mortgage bonds at a certain figure?

Q. 5.—If so, what was that figure and was any money paid on account?

Q. 6.—Was the government's party to the release of Lisman & Co. from their contract or have they been released?

Q. 7.—Were not President Gould's arrangements with Lisman & Co. reported by him to the government and the fact not in part a reason for the assurance that the premier gave the people of New Brunswick that "satisfactory financial arrangements had been completed."

Q. 8.—Was this T. J. Carter's representation at that time and at this time in the house of assembly?

Q. 9.—If so, did not the said T. J. Carter by accepting payment from a public officer in the service of the province of New Brunswick violate section 14 of the election law which says that: "No person whose holding or engaging in, undertaking or executing directly or indirectly, or with any other person or by the interposition of a trustee or a third party, any contract or agreement with his majesty, or with any public officer or department with respect to the public service of New Brunswick or under which any public money of New Brunswick is expended for any service or work, matter or thing, shall be eligible as a member of the legislative assembly, nor shall he sit or vote in the same."

Q. 10.—Whether the action of Mr. Carter in accepting the payment referred to or in his violation of section 14 of the election law is a question of law for the determination of a court or other body having jurisdiction therein, and is not a matter of fact concerning which the government should make any statement.

Q. 11.—In view of the fact that T. J. Carter's violation of the law, as quoted above, is the intention of the government to take any action?

Q. 12.—In view of the fact that the Dominion government has appointed a commissioner to investigate the charges made by F. B. Carrel, M.P., in the house of commons, relating to the report of the engineer of the department of railways and canal works, which the double subsidy was paid the Southampton Railway Co., does the government of New Brunswick, having guaranteed bonds for the same railway to the extent of \$18,000,000, propose to be represented at the investigation?
