150,000 CANADIANS UNDER ARMS, WITH DRAFTS AS NEEDED

Ottawa, March 17-Although only some 4,000 men of the second contingent have as yet left Canada for the front, and although the units of the third atingent are not yet fully equipped and recruited at some of the mibilization stress, the militia department is already taking steps to gradually recruit for a further draft of reinforcements. The intention of the militia department is not to send over any further complete army divisions, but rather to forward infantry and other branches of the servvice in batches of several thousand men


