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MONCTON FIRE DOES
\$50,000 DAMAGE

Moncton, Sept. 7.—During the early
hours of this morning Moncton was
visited by a serious conflagration which
started in the Moncton Livery Stables
on Mechanic street, and spread with such
incredible rapidity that within a short
time a large block of wooden buildings
with eight horses and other valuable
contents had been destroyed with an
estimated property loss of over \$50,000.
The buildings burned included the
Moncton Livery Stables, curling rink,
Marks carriage factory, No. 1 fire sta-
tion, M. T. E. & Co. warehouse.
For a time it was feared that portion
of the city east of the fire would be
destroyed, as a high wind prevailed
at the time. Good work by the firemen,
however, prevented the fire spreading
east of Marks's carriage factory.
The conflagration had its origin in
Moncton Livery Stables, formerly owned
by L. B. Reade and eight horses were
burned. The estimated losses follow:
Livery stable building, owned by Mrs.
R. J. Duffy, \$1,500, insurance \$700.
Curling rink, \$6,000, insurance \$4,000.
