COMMON SCHOOLS ACT.

Notice is hereby given:

1. That public schools will not be granted

in aid of school taught between Dec. 30th

1871, and January 31st, 1872.

2. That the Board of School Districts

established under the authority of the Common

Schools Act, 1871, will shortly be posted in each

School District of the Province, a list of the

names of the Trustees of the Schools of the

Province on January 11th, 1872, at 10 o'clock, a. m.

3. That the first Annual Meeting of the

Trustees of the Schools of the Province will be

held on January 11th, 1872, at 10 o'clock, a. m.

4. That the Trustees of the Schools of the

Province are required to attend the Annual

Meeting, as prescribed by the Common

Schools Act, 1871, in the following manner:

(1) The election from among the qualified

Trustees of the Schools of the Province, of a

Chairman to preside over the meeting, and

to determine all questions of order, to take

the vote of qualified voters, and to decide

according to the majority of votes, and to

give a casting vote in case of an equality

of votes.

(2) The election, from among the qualified

voters present, of a Secretary to record its

proceedings.
