Middleton Branch W. I. Hold Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Middleton Branch of the N. S. Womans Institute was held on Thursday evening Nov. 28 in the school auditorium. President, Mrs. G. F. Freeman presided.

The work of the past eight months was reviewed in the Secretary's report, showing that a very successful period had been spent. The treasurer reported that the sum of \$272.74 had been raised during that time, and had been largely expended for hospital supplies and furnishings.

The need of protection of the unguarded railway crossing on School and Commercial Streets has been brought to the attention of the Institute. A resolution has been drawn up, and will be sent to the proper authorities to determine what can be done to protect the lives of pedestrians at these crossings.

A nursing class is to be formed the first of the new year, which will we

feel be very beneficial to those anxious to learn more about home nursing. The sum of \$25.00 previously prescribed to the Inter-Provincial Home at Moncton was voted paid.

A very interesting paper on the Public Health prepared by Miss A. Young and Mrs. Spurr was read by Miss Young.

A solo by Miss Marjorie Parker, beautifully rendered was greatly appreciated by all present.
