## RUSSIA SIGNS PEACE TREATY; ACCEPTS Markets of the World GERMAN TERMS WITHOUT DISCUSSION

Bolshevik Delegates Consent to New Conditions and German Advance Into Country is Discontinued.

London, March 3.—The Peace The Teutonic advance into the drice treaty between Germany and Russia Ukraine, under the German command-

treaty between Germany and Russia has been signed.

"By reason of the signing of the peace treaty with Russia," says the official communication from German headquarters to-night, "military movements in Great Russia have ceased."

The Russian delegation at Brest-Litovsk accepted all German peace conditions without discussing the contents of the treaty, although they were aware that the demands had been increased according to a telegram sent by them from Brest-Litovsk to the Smolthy Institute at Petrograd.

"The most serious feature of the new demands compared with those of Feb. 21 is the following:

"To detach the regions of Karaband, Kars and Batoum from Russian territory on the pretext of the right of peoples to self-determination."

The Teutonic advance into the Ukraine, under the German command et, Gen. von Linsingen, has been one of considerable rapidity, the new invasion having been begun on Feb. 18th, the distance of approximately 200 miles to Kiev from the former German front, having thus been covered in but little more than ten days. There is small evidence of resistance in the German progress, however, all though the Bolsheviki threatened a determined fight for the retention of Kiev.

Berlin, March 3.—The Germans in their advance through Russia have captured, according to the official statement from general headquarters, 6,800 officers and 57,000 men, 2,400 guns, 5,000 machine guns, thousands of motor vehicles, 800 locomotives and thousands of railroad trucks.
