Beavers Triple Score on Aces

FUSILLADE OF HITS IN FIFTH INNING, CHANGES DEFEAT INTO VICTORY.

The Beavers came to life on Saturday and took the league leaders into camp by a 9-3 score, breaking even off the two-game series, and sending home the large afternoon crowd in the best of spirits.

The Aces started out in an auspicious manner, scoring two runs in the first inning and a third run before the Beavers got their big berths in shape, and for a time it looked as though the locals were destined for another thumping.

For four innings Wisner, who was going in a big league style, had not allowed the Beavers the slightest semblance of a hit and consequently the fans had little to cheer for until the eventual fifth came along and the way Kitchener assaulted Wisner's slants in this big session was a joy to behold.

Wisner helped things along nicely by permitting the first two men up a free pass each, then followed three singles, a double and triple and when the end of the triumphal procession came six runners had crowned the plate and converted defeat into victory.

Lodestros had no trouble in holding the Saginaws in check for the rest of the game.

The Saginaws tried hard to stage a come-back in the next four innings and while they succeeded in getting runners on the paths they were invariably stranded, eleven men being left on the bases during the nine frames.

Lodestro pitched good ball throughout and the first inning was the only one in which he showed signs of discomfiture.

The London Teumsehans open a three game series here this evening commencing at 6 o'clock and the Beavers, believing that their jinx has now vanished, hope to make a clean sweep of the three game series.

Umpire Forfeits Game to Stratford in Inter-County

McBRINES' LEADING 2-1 AT TIME—INVESTIGATION THIS WEEK

McBrine's were leading 2-1 in the fifth inning of Saturday afternoon's scheduled fixture with Stratford in the Cheshire City in the home umpire forfeited the game to Stratford, 9-0 owing to the fact that the visitors did not have an extra man to replace Dunbrook who had been banished for too vigorously protesting a strike.

There has been a great deal of complaint since the opening of the season over the matter of the performance of the home umpires in all the towns of the circuit whose mottoes evidently have been "we aim to please—the home fans" and Saturday's fiasco at Stratford was the limit of endurance, according to reports from those who witnessed the contest.

When the circuit was organized the Stratford delegates were sponsors for the home umpire rule which was put on the books here with Stratford in the lead.

It will be recalled at the meeting which will be called this week, to investigate the Stratford game.

A good crowd turned out to witness the Inter-County League battle, but the behavior of the home fans was even worse reports say, as not to lend any prestige to the Stratfordites for sportsmanship.

The First Weekly Club Golf Match

MAY FORM AN INTER-COUNTY LEAGUE.

At the first weekly club match at the Golf grounds Team B. won from Team A, playing thirteen men to a side. The individual scores were somewhat high, owing to recent rains leaving the field soggy in places. Mr. T. A. Witzel and Mr. F. S. Hodgins were tied for first place.

To decide the matter, they pulled around the clock. Mr. Witzel made the round in 25 and Mr. Hodgins in 26, both playing a cool-headed game. Mr. J. A. Weir was awarded the consolation prize.

Among the visiting players were Major Richardson, D.S.O., of London, who is the guest of Captain Proctor. He entered the Canadian service as a private and won a majorship on merit in the field.

Another was Mr. Maurice Webster, of Philadelphia, who is the guest of Mr. Hodgins.

An effort is being made to form an inter-county golf league, with this city, Guelph, Stratford, Galt and possibly Woodstock members, with the possibility of a trophy as the yearly prize to the winners of the series.

The mixed foursome which was scheduled to be played a week ago Saturday may be played next Wednesday afternoon.

The club has purchased a golfball marker, which stamps the names of the players on the balls. This is an economic move.

Having learned that there was a movement afoot on the part of the city to purchase the Hamel property, opposite the Country Club for a cemetery, the club protested to the Provincial Board of Health. On Saturday afternoon Colonel Dr. McCullough paid a visit to the city in order to view the site and obtain information concerning the adaptability of the proposed land and to weigh objections.

Accompanied by Alderman Grob and Engineer Michel, Dr. McCullough met the Country Club membership and heard their objections. The golfers take the ground that it would be ethically objectionable to place a cemetery cheek by jowl with an athletic field.

No one would care to play while a funeral was at the cemetery; nor like the idea of slicing a ball into it.

It was also urged that the 25 acres accompanying the Hamel property would be too small a cemetery site for this growing center. Wherever a new cemetery is located it should be ample large for fifty or one hundred years hence and it should have direct railway communication. The city should plan for a population of 50,000. The Hamel property, was in their opinion, soon to be required for building purposes.

Dr. McCullough took notes on the objections raised and will report later. Before the city could purchase and make a cemetery there it must obtain the assent of both the Township and Provincial Boards of Health.
