Question of Interest in Canada as Well

chicago is conducted to the Mississippi tif or via Des Plaines and illinois Ricers, the St. Louis peopla
insisting that there will follow effects detrimental to the waters of
the Mississippi at the latter city,
it is well known from chemical waters of this country te-

It is well known from chemical unalysis and physical examination hat a varying degree of purification akes place in a river in the course of its progress. of its progress.

In early days this was thought to be due to aeration, and the tumbling of water down mountain sides became the basis for poetic typification of purity. The experiments of the Mas-sachusetts State Board of Health have shown that aeration has little or no effect upon the condition of oror no enect upon the condition of organic matter in water—that is, the organic matter is not assisted in its oxidation by agitation in the air. It was also found that the highest degree of acti ity in oxidation processive. es is to be found in quiescent or tagnant waters. It then became stagnant waters. It then became clear that self purification in a slug-gish stream is far more effective than in a swift current and that dams and other impediments have a beneficial effect upon the condition of water in

river channels.

The promulgation of these facts led to an entire change in the ideas concerning the distance necessary for stream purification, and it is now understood that no hard and fast rules can be set for guidance in determining the purifying power of any

ing the purifying power of any water-course.

The work undertaken by the hydrographic experts of the U.S. Government will therefore be useful in the ment will therefore be useful in the determination of the self purifying powers of many of the interstate rivers. These results will be highly beneficial to the municipalities and corporations which may be looking toward the establishment of sewerage systems and purification works.

Selecting Seed Potatoes

How many farmers make a proper harvesting of the crop in the tall the year? Probably not 5 per cent. the men in these provinces make any selection until the following spring. The whole crop is gathered and what is not immediately marketed is run into a bin in the cellar. Then when planting time comes what is left to select from is rather poor stuff.

Why is it that we hear so many farmers talking about getting a hange of seed potatoes, that their potatoes have run out? Is it mainly because of this lack of proper selec tion? The results of experiments at the Ontario Agricultural College, as well as the Macdonald Seed Grain Competition tend to prove in the case of grain at least that with proper selection each year there is no need of a change of seed, that is, the seed will not run out. Now if this is the case with cereals why not with potatoes?

During the month of June I was passing through a portion of Queen's County, N. B., and in conversation with a farmer I asked him how long he kept potatoes on his farm without changing the seed. He said he tried to get fresh seed every fourth or fifth the tried to get fresh seed every fourth or fifth the tried to get fresh seed every fourth or fifth where ear. I went out to his field where he was planting and from the nature of the seed he was then using I think it would pay him to change every year if not oftener. The largest potatoes in his basket were not more than one-half inch in diameter.

it required a second look to convince
one they were potatoes at all.

To one who has been a careful observer in the growing of potatoes it
will be evident that, although plenty
of fertilizer and a well prepared soil
are very essential for the production
of a large crop of good quality, the
proper selection of seed as of greater
importance.

In the selection of seed one need not be at a loss as to variety, as they are legion. But it is always best to grow those which are great-est in demand in your particular mar-

When the crop is ready to be har when the crop is leady to be harvested go through the field and select the hills with large thrifty vines and save the seed from these, providing they are uniform, of good size and plenty in a hill. By followng op this system good results may

follow.

In diaging the crop it is often the case that only one or two large retatoes are found in a hill. Now be they ever so large or smooth or well formed, they would be poor stock for planting, as the likelihood would, if such were used, be a crop with few in a hill.—P. G. Mills, in Maritime Fermer.
