The C. P. R. shops at McAdam, which have been shut down for some time, will resume operations on the 1st of September.

## Flour Prices Drop Again.

Ontario flour dropped off in price 10 cents yesterday and the jobbing price is now six dollars. A recent reduction brought the price of Manitoba brands down to \$6.75 per barrel.

## Stanley Liquor Seller to Jail.

Constable Ward arrived from Stanley today with one Turnbull, sentenced to one month in jail by Magistrate Clarkson in default of payment of a \$50 fine for violation of the Scott Act.

McLeod performed the ceremony which was witnessed by relatives and intimate friends. The bride was given away by her father, Mr. O. Smyth Mersereau. Both young people are extremely popular and appreciation of the esteem in which they were held by a large circle of friends found tangible expression in the number of handsome and costly gifts.

## Brass Band Has Labor Day Date.

At a general meeting of the members of the Trade Unions of the city last evening, it was decided that the Unions would not hold the proposed picnic on Labor day, Sept. 6th, but would let the Fredericton Brass Band have the date for their proposed mammoth picnic and bazaar on the Old Government House grounds, which the band has secured through the kindness of Hon. John Morrissey, the Chief Commissioner of Public Works. The union members also passed a vote of thanks to both the Fredericton Brass Band and the 71st Regt. band for assistance at festivals put on by the unions during the past season.

## Scott Act at the Junction.

At Fredericton Junction today before Commissioner Thomas Alexander, commissioner of the parish of Gladstone, the hearing was resumed in a charge of alleged violation of the Canadian Temperance Act preferred by Scott Act Inspector Thomas, of York County, against the Canadian Hotel. This case was taken up on Saturday last when three witnesses, George Fisher, Alfred Patchell and Edward Banks, were examined. Fisher said he had been in the Canadian Hotel but had not procured liquor there. He had got ginger beer. The other witnesses also swore they had not got liquor there between the dates mentioned in the information, June 15th and August 2nd. Four other witnesses were to have been called but they did not appear and warrants were issued for them and the case adjourned until today.

VARIETY OF LIQUOR  
SEIZED AT MCADAM

Whiskey in All Sizes of Bottles  
and 26 Gallons in Bulk as  
Well as Other Liquors at  
City Camp Hotel.

A Scott Act raid was made on Wednesday on City Camp Hotel at McAdam Junction, now managed by Andrew Mowatt. The raid was made by Constable Irvine Rogerson just about supper time on papers issued by Magistrate Luke Lawson, the county Scott Act Inspector, W. L. McFarlane being at McAdam to superintend operations.

Judging from the supply of liquor seized it would seem that a special importation had been made for the circus crowds on Saturday.

An inventory of the seized liquor made by Inspector McFarlane shows 26 gallons of whiskey in bulk, four quart bottles of ale, 97 pint bottles of whiskey, 46 half pint bottles of whiskey, 2 gallons of gin in bulk, 27 square faces of gin, 4 quart bottles of "stout" and 4 quart bottles of ale and one pint bottle of lager beer.

It is usual in such cases to take action against the proprietor of the place where the liquor is seized and if the action is successful, an order is issued for the destruction of the seized liquor.

## TUBERCULOSIS COMMISSION.

Committee Will Probably Inspect Sanatoriums at Saranac Lake Before Site for Provincial Institution is Decided On.

The Tuberculosis commission appointed by the provincial government and composed of members of the medical profession in the province met last evening at the Barker House. Those present included Dr. J. R. McIntosh of St. John, the chairman; Dr. Rankine, Woodstock, Dr. Bourque, M. P. P. of Kent county, Dr. Botsford of Moncton, Dr. McAvaney and Dr. Inches of St. John and Dr. Robertson of Keswick Ridge.

The question of a site for the proposed sanatorium was considered but nothing definite was decided. Drs. McAvaney and Botsford reported on having visited proposed sites at Welsford, Keswick Ridge, and near Fredericton Junction, and it is understood that the last named was looked upon with the most favor by the committee.

There are other proposed sites which will be visited before any definite decision is reached and it is likely that Drs. McIntosh, McAvaney and Botsford will make an inspection of the sanatoriums at Saranac Lake, N. Y., before the next meeting is held. The date for the next meeting has not yet been decided.

REV. M'CONNELL  
ACCEPTS THE CALL

Pastor of Methodist Church Announced Today That He Will go to Sydney, C. B. Next June.

Rev. J. W. McConnell, pastor of the Fredericton Methodist church and one of the best known ministers in the Maritime Provinces, has accepted a call tendered him recently to the pastorate of the Jubilee Church at Sydney, C. B.

Rev. Neill McLaughlin of St. John, will be the next pastor of the local church and the changes will take place at the end of the present conference year in June next. Rev. Mr. McConnell's change to Sydney will make necessary his transfer from the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island to the Nova Scotia conference and this change with others will come before the transfer committee of the General Methodist Conference of Canada meeting at Toronto next April.

Rev. Mr. McConnell returned this week to resume his duties after six weeks vacation and this morning made the announcement that he had decided to accept the Sydney call, which will make him pastor of the largest Methodist church in Cape Breton.

When the time comes for his removal to Sydney, Rev. Mr. McConnell will just about have completed twenty years in the ministry of the Methodist church. Nineteen years ago he was ordained and his first charge was at Gibson, across the river from this city. Later, he was at Campbellton and for seven years was in Prince Edward Island. Before coming to Fredericton, Rev. Mr. McConnell was at Moncton. He accepted a call to this city in 1906 and completed his term of three years last June when he was requested to remain the extra year, which he is now doing.

Rev. Mr. McConnell has been a popular pastor in this city and has taken a prominent part in the various organizations in which he has been interested. His very many friends will deeply regret his impending departure.
