

PUBLIC NOTICE HYDRO RATES

Ontario Hydro has announced that commencing January 1, 1981, the effective increase in the cost of power to Hydro Mississauga will be 9.2 percent.

Despite efforts to control local rising costs, Hydro Mississauga will have to pass this increase on to its Consumers because the wholesale cost of power constitutes about 89 percent of its total costs.

Hydro Mississauga has made application to adjust its 1980 rates upward, which will produce an average increase to Consumers of 9.2 percent. The results of the rate revision will vary among Consumers.

New rates will apply to all bills issued on and from January 1, 1981. Electrical energy used before January 1, 1981 will be costed at 1980 rates. The detailed rate schedule will be published as soon as approved by Ontario Hydro.
