At a meeting of the Com<sup>rs</sup> of Indian Affairs in Albany 8<sup>th</sup> 1723  
having rec<sup>d</sup>. Intelligence that 80 Indians are gone from Canada to attempt  
some of our neighbours in England & desired to send an Express with  
following Letter.

a Clock at Night

Gentlemen

Just now received the Surprising news  
that fifty Indians from Canada were about 8 days  
ago in the Lake at the Otter Creek w<sup>th</sup> a Design  
to fall on some of your out Settlements we think  
it our Duty to acquaint you with this Intelle-  
gence without any Loss of Time, hoping that  
you may be on your Guard at the frontiers to  
frustrate the Barbarous & Bloody Designs  
of these Inhumane Brutes whose mercy is  
nothing but Cruelty we shall be glad to hear  
that this Indian War may soon Cease that  
Christians may not be murdered and fall  
as a prey to those Salvages, and that this  
Intelligence
