

Regina, Sept. 29th, 1919.

Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, House of Commons, Ottawa. Ontario.

Dear Mr. King: -

I have your telegram of the 27th instant with respect to the National Liberal Organization Committee. As I pointed out to you in a letter some time ago, it would be a difficult matter to get representatives on this Committee from this province appointed in the manner indicated in the instructions you sent out; in fact, at the present time it is impossible. I, therefore, asked that I might be allowed to appoint them, after consultation with some of our friends here. This has taken time as it has been necessary for me to write to the various parties and get their approval. All of those whose names I am submitting have not yet consented to act, but in order to expedite matters I have thought it advisable to send you the names and addresses and if any changes are necessary they can be made at a later date.

With respect to the matter of a Vice-president for the Province, I am gradually coming to the conclusion that it will be far better for all concerned if I do not act in this capacity. I am allowing my name to stand in the meantime, however, until I am able to suggest someone in my place. I may suggest one of the five names that I am sending now or perhaps someone in addition.
