For a few days the savage feasts and wild dances were suspended in order to hear him, but when several were converted who declined to return to the dance-house, a council of the chiefs was called, and Wahuksgumalayou was ordered to desist and return immediately to his dance, the Thigwalla. To this he objected, stating that the new way was better and that he had finished his old work; at which they became enraged and
