FROM YESTERDAY'S LAST EDITION M'CONKEY FAILS TO WIN APPEAL ASK THAT THE BAY BE WATCHED

Suspension of Restaurateur's License Still Holds Good. It is Feared That Prof. Lavell Was Drowned When He Disappeared.

TORONTO, March 16.—Judge Denton this morning dismissed the appeal of Ernest M'Conkey from the decision of Police Magistrate Denison, suspending the liquor license on account of the disorderly conduct permitted in the restaurant last New Year's eve. In giving his decision, his honor described the affair as "revelry by night." It was a fair assumption that the reason women were carried out was because they were too drunk to walk out.

Not only could the proprietor be penalized, but the guests could have been fined for their participation in the affair. He discredited the theory that the magistrate convicted on a policeman's evidence alone. While the guests were in many cases reputable citizens, they were not particularly anxious to give evidence showing that they were keeping disorderly company. There is no appeal from the judge's decision.

The license is valued at \$5,000. While the license is on suspended, it will have to come up for renewal on May 1st and it is probable there will be great difficulty in securing a renewal from the commissioners.

The chimney had caught fire and a spark fire had dropped on the roof burning about four feet of the ridge. The fire department made a fast run and laid one line of hose. The damage done will amount to about \$10.

Horseback Jumping Forbidden

According to military orders received from headquarters to-day by Major Gordon Smith, jumping on horseback has been forbidden in the military camps this year. The reason for this step is that the government does not give any compensation for injury to horses and this is one of the principal ways in which horses are injured while in camp. Young fellows go to camp with a rented horse and get careless, which generally results in an injury to the mount. Although no official orders have been received here, it is understood that the Dragons will go to camp at Niagara about June 1st.

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SIX WEEKS FOR THE MASQUERADER

Woman's Only Regret Was That She Failed to Whip Premier Asquith.

[By Special Wire to The Courier] LONDON, March 17.—A sentence of six weeks at hard labor was pronounced to-day by the police magistrate on Katherine Wilson, a militant suffragette, who was arrested last night in the lobby of the House of Commons, while dressed in men's clothing and carrying a dog whip secreted in her sleeve. She was charged as a suspected person.

She said to the magistrate: "Of course I shall not serve the sentence," and added, "I went to the House of Commons to give Premier Asquith or Home Secretary McKenna a good thrashing."
