Toronto, Feb. 3.-Dr. Hodgetts, in

Taberculesis Victims.

Toronto, Feb. 3.—Dr. Hodgetts, in his masterly report to the Provincial Board of Health yesterday morning, characterized as criminal negligence the apparent disinclination of the municipal authorities of the Province to deal with the question of providing municipal sanitaria for consumptives, and strongly urged the necessity for such institutions. The comment was provoked by the fact that the deaths from tuberculosis had increased from 2,072 to 2,165, as compared with last year.

The total deaths for the year 1904 were 25,415, as compared with 25,-267 in 1903. Those from infectious diseases were: Smallpox, cases 3,165, deaths 129; diphtheria, cases 3,045, deaths 4; scarlatina, cases 3,045, deaths 23; whooping cough, cases 268, deaths 997; tuberculosis, cases 2,232, deaths 2,165. The total deaths numbered 25,411, against 25,278, monomer 25,411, against 25,278,


