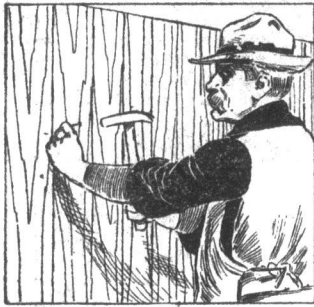

## PYGMY HIPPO AND ELAND.

Two Animals of Africa That Are  
Practically Unknown.

There are two animals practically un-  
known to the outside world. These are  
the pygmy or Liberian hippopotamus and  
the Derbian eland. The first named is  
just what its name implies, a pygmy  
hippopotamus, differing from the larger  
and common variety in three respects  
only. In the first place, it is much  
smaller than the common Hippopotamus  
amphibius, being no larger than an  
ordinary fair sized hog; in the second  
place, it differs somewhat from the  
common hippo in the character of its  
teeth, and, in the third place, instead  
of spending its time in the rivers and  
lakes in large herds it wanders about  
through the jungles singly or in pairs,  
much after the manner of swine in  
search of mast. Owing to the fact that  
it does not go in herds and is hard to  
distinguish against the dark back-  
ground of jungle thickets it is an ex-  
ceedingly difficult animal to hunt or  
find. If anything the legs of the dwarf  
Liberian hippopotamus are a trifle longer  
in proportion than are those of the  
common river hippopotamus.

Next to the Liberian hippopotamus  
the Derbian eland of west Africa,  
which the Mandingos call "Jinke Jank-  
ko," is today the least known of all  
rare and strange animals.—Outing.

## HOWARD COUNCIL.

The municipal council of the

drain is taken out of its natural  
course which is a detriment to lot 1  
con. 1. W. E. B. advised the coun-  
cil to attend to same.

From Duncan Galbraith, Harwich,  
stating that he received \$10 from  
the township of Harwich as their  
share for use of his field during the  
construction of the McGregor creek  
bridge, and as Howard had only con-  
tributed \$7.50, wished to remit the  
balance, \$2.50.

From James R. Scott, owner of  
part lot 84, T. R. N., stating that he  
would accept the sum of \$250 for  
all that parcel of land situated on  
the north side of Talbot street on  
the south corner of the above lot,  
comprising about three-quarters of  
an acre.

From Jenks & Dresser, Port  
Huron, stating that the bridge over  
McGregor creek, 6 and 7 sideroad, is  
now ready for shipment and wished  
advice as to same.

be appointed to take her over.—Carried.

Leatherdale—Arnold, that the re-  
quest of Mr. John Shaw and Mr.  
Sample be granted and the lots 12  
and 113 in con. 7 and 8 constitute  
such division and that John Shaw  
be pathmaster for same.—Carried.

Galbraith—Leatherdale, that the

lowances for Sunday or legal holidays)  
and election one week later. First  
meeting to be held first Monday af-  
ter election and last meeting on the  
last day of December; also giving  
councils power to have their ac-  
counts audited and auditors report  
published before the nomination and  
distributed on that day thereby do-  
ing away with the detailed state-  
ments published on Dec. 18th. The  
clerk to send copy of this resolution  
to the reeves and mayors of the dif-
