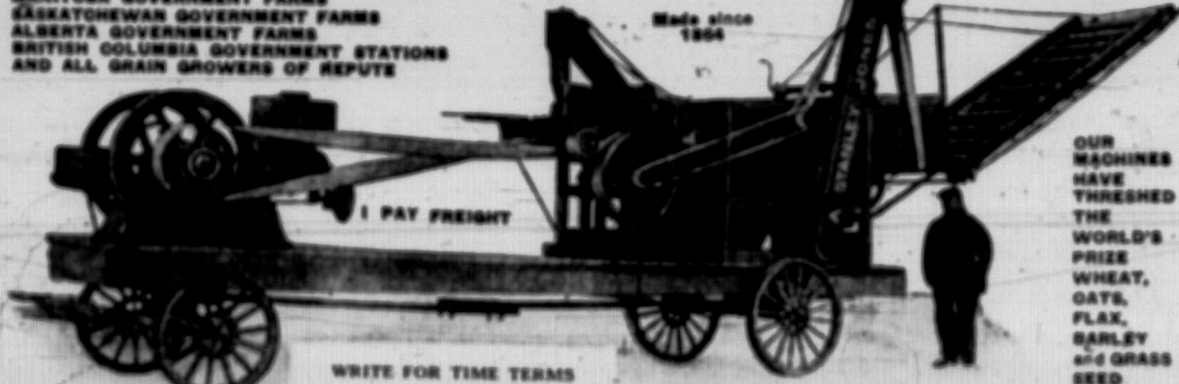

strong linen thread, taking care to hold
the thread loosely to the already started
mat. If you don't you will find it form
into a sort of cap and won't lay flat on
floor.

* You can make them round or oblong
and any size you desire. They are excel-
lent as they don't scrape up as easily as
do other mats or pieces of carpet. To
clean them use a vacuum washer if you
have one. Put them through soap suds
with some lye or washing powder of any
kind. Rinse and hang on line to drip
dry as they are too hard to wring by hand
and too thick to put through wringer,
and they also look smoother done in this
way.

I also have crocheted mats, but I find
the braided ones more satisfactory.
