He also broke all intermediate records between 3.1-2 and 10 miles. The former outdoor American record for ten miles was 52.34.35 made four years ago by George Bonhag, who also held the American intermediate records from seven to ten miles. The winner's time Saturday is the best and three-quarter seconds behind the world's record held by Alfred Shrubbs. The National A. A.
