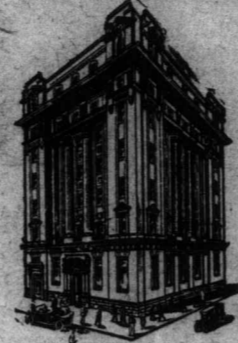

STIRRING SCENES AS CANADIAN TROOPS TAKE UP CAMP IN ENGLAND

SALISBURY, England, Oct. 16.—(Via London 2:40 p.m.) Beginning before dawn today from stations within a radius of ten miles Canadian troops have been pouring into camps prepared for them on the rolling Salisbury Plains near here.

First came a long transport train composed of wagons drawn by traction engines, then the motor trucks and lastly the commander London motor buses. The cavalry and the artillery followed and most of these units are now in camp, but only a few infantry regiments so far have arrived.

Long before dawn the sleepy old villages scattered over the country were awakened by the clang of hoofs on the hard roads, which, incidentally, have been a revelation to the Canadians, accustomed to their own muddy highways.

Those who listened heard a strange medley. The notes of "It's a Long, Long Way to Tipperary," the "Annie L." and the Spanish-American war favorite, "There'll be a Hot Time in the Old Town To-night." The latest American ragtime, "This is the Life," also resounded in the quiet English dales.

Along the roads the troops everywhere were received with enthusiasm. The English people, expecting a wild west display, however, were disappointed, for with the exception of the sombrero worn by the cavalry, the uniforms of the Canadian army were the same as those of the English troops.

Several English territorial regiments have been engaged in preparing the Canadian camps and acting as convoy corps. The greatest contrast to be seen between these forces and the Canadians is the difference in physique, the Canadians being on an average much larger men and stronger looking than their English comrades.

Riding at the head of the supply convoy was a small Montreal newsboy, who had stowed away on a transport. This little chap, in spite of the fact that he was almost lost in the folds of an army coat, loaned him by a good-hearted sergeant of Highlanders, was nearly frozen, but he insisted on practicing the bugle, proficiency in which he hopes will give him a chance to go to the front.

When dawn came to Canadians found themselves camped on a lonely rolling plain of great extent, which must have reminded the western troops of their own prairies. This camping ground, so unlike the England they had been taught to expect, was somewhat of a disappointment to the native born Canadians.

There is a surprising number of naturalized Americans among these Canadian forces. A sergeant of a Montreal regiment, asked concerning his previous war experience, declared in an American drawl, incidentally he mentioned that he was a veteran of Admiral Dewey's flagship in the battle of Manila Bay. In many regiments social distinctions have been obliterated, and men of fortune with degrees from Canadian and American colleges, are serving as privates.

On Saturday the only saloon within the camp will be occupied by the Canadian staff headquarters, and at the same time it will be declared "out of bounds."

A DIVIDED NATION--UNHAPPY POLAND IS SERVING 3 MASTERS

The magnitude of the great drama now being played out on Polish soil and its close connection with British interests makes it seem desirable that more light should be thrown upon scenes no less portentous, although farther removed from the battlefields of Belgium and France, writes a correspondent of the Times.

As the name of Poland is commonly applied by the English press to the whole of the Polish territory, a very large section of the public is ignorant of the extent to which Poland is involved in the present conflict. Yet the whole of the vast battle line passing from the west (Lemberg) to Poznan (Posen) through Przemysl, Krakow, Bendzin, Czenstochowa, and Kalisz, is a line drawn through Polish cities, centres of Polish culture and industry, of Polish patriotism, whatever the uniform worn by the unfortunate Poles, called upon in this hour of darkness to serve three different masters.

Sugar-Coated Policy
Almost immediately upon the outbreak of war between Russia and Prussia-riding Austria, the Austrian government made a powerful appeal to the loyalty of the Austrian Poles. The great attachment of the Polish nation to its faith, its language, and its ideals has never been ignored by modern Austria, who grants a fair share of autonomy to Galicia, her share of Poland, has easily earned the gratitude of a confident population, incapable of understanding the fundamental insincerity of her sugar-coated policy.

I have before me some Austrian-Polish papers which, besides revealing the extraordinary inaccuracy with which the Berlin supplies her unfortunate ally, throw a tragic light upon the Galician situation.

'Austrian Poles Deluded'
The Austrian Poles appealed to by all that they hold sacred, by their highest patriotic ideals, as well as by a sense of gratitude to a government which had allowed them at least to feel free whilst it cunningly hampered their economic and national development, rallied around the Austrian standard.

Vienna encouraged both material and morally the formation of Polish legions; and from the highest aristocracy to the poorest peasant, the Poles flocked, father and sons, together, to serve what they believed to be the cause of justice and liberty.

Austria's Dictator
Blinded by sentiment to the dictates of political reason, the Austrian Emperor, remembered only her kindness, forgot that Austria's dictator, Prussia, was and always had been the arch-enemy of his race; he forgot above all, to come to an understanding with the great majority of his fellows beyond the frontier, with the Kingdom of Poland, with Warsaw, the nation's heart and centre.

Meanwhile, Prussia, too, was descending to blandishments, seeking to buy, both in concert with Austria and on her own account the loyalty of her long persecuted Polish population. Nor did she stop at active anti-Russian propaganda carried over the border.

There is no shadow of a doubt that had Russian Poland risen in revolt during the first half of August, seizing the ally of France and Britain the pliancy of an initial Poland. An insurrection of over 20,000,000 souls would have stood between Russia and Western Europe, not merely a barrier to the Russian advance, but the ready tool of the German coalition.

Warsaw, through the wisdom of its political leaders, stood firm in that perilous hour.

So there was no revolution. The Kingdom of Poland remained loyal, and there followed almost immediately that proclamation by which the Russian Empire of yesterday, has given proof to the civilized world of its metamorphosis into the Russian Empire of to-day.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

(THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. Habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 60 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 60 acres and erect a house worth \$800.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
