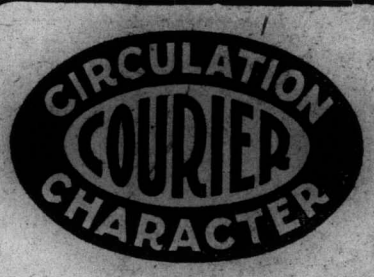

German Description of a British Push—"In the Flanders Hell"

London, Dec. 5.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—A German description of a British bombardment, smoke screen, attacks with gas, flame-throwers and tanks followed by a charge of Canadians and Scots published by the Berlin Post is entitled "In the Flanders Hell."

"For weeks, day and night," says the writer, "the British kept our position under fire. Ever fiercer bursts of the glowing stream that poured crackling down upon us. Every day this fire grew hotter. Our artillery replied powerfully. The Army commander spoke of a concentration of heavy artillery fire on individual sectors. Even we cannot describe what that means. The history of the world has never seen anything more awful. All calibres were brought into action, and a crater of unprecedented extent opened beside the others, was excavated afresh, swallowed up the old ones, spread out beyond the line trees and threw up the hinterland. Nothing remained intact of all that nights of hard labour under the enemy's fire had created."
