CANADA'S IRON IN BRITAIN.

Ottawa, Ont., May 28.—In his annual coport to the Minister of Trade and commerce, Canadian Government Commerce, Canadian Government Agent Murray, at Glasgow, says:

"The importation of pig iron from the Dominion to the Clyde has created quite a sensation. Fifty-three thousand tons were discharged during the year, and three or four cargoes are now on the way. The iron serves the same purpose as Scotch or English foundry iron, and is principally used by foundries. Some of it, however, is used by pipe and malleable iron manufacturers.
