COMMERCIAL SPONSES

P. H. Currie, of Massan, Bahama Islands, was in the city yesterday calling upon the Canada Flour Mills Co. Mr. Currie is in the sponge and commission business at Massau. The Bahamas are one of the greatest places for sponges in the world. Very little is known about sponges beyond that they belong to the lowest order of the animal kingdom and a Sponge and Turtle Board is being formed in Massau mainly for the purpose of studying the sponge. The sponges are secured in from six to 60 feet of water. A long pole with an iron hook is put down and the sponges are pulled from their watery home. Sometimes the sponge grows on the mud bottom and sometimes on the reefs. There are two kinds, the reef and the wool. The former is the better. The wool sponge is a black looking mass. The pores of the sponges are filled with animal matter. A kraal is built on the beach and the sponges are put in this. When dry they are taken out and beaten with a club and then washed. This removes the jelly filling from the pores.

Mr. Currie says that the temperature never goes above 94 or 95 in the shade in summer, and a day like to-day would be a cold day in winter Naturally it may be surmised that the Bahama climate is delightful. P. H. Currie, of Massan, Bahama
