SEVEN KILLED IN STORM	PASSED AWAY	A CHATHAM MAN
St. Thomas, June 11.—Friday 35 men were at work building a new barn, four miles northeast of Springfield, owned by James McClintock, when the terrible windstorm struck them. A number of men were in the act of raising a large beam when the wind struck the building, which collapsed, crushing down on the men. Two, named William Clapton, aged 35 years, and M. Wilson, a lad of 17 years of age, who were working in the basement, were killed instantly. Wilson, father of the young lad killed, is also seriously injured and his hand was badly crushed. It had to be amputated. Several others were also seriously injured. Boy Killed at Brownsville. It is also reported that a boy named Griffith was killed by the collapse of a barn near Brownsville, which is close to Springfield. Miss Biggar Killed by Lightning. St. Catharines, June 11.—Miss Lizzie Biggar of Port Robinson, sister of ex-Deputy William Biggar of Crowland Township, was killed by lightning at her home Friday night while the electric storm was in progress. Farmer Killed by Lightning. Mariposa, Ont., June 11.—Henry James of Little Britain, Ont., who was standing against his barn, was struck and killed by lightning, and two others who were standing with him were knocked down during the heavy storm which prevailed during Friday evening. One Was Killed. Zurich, June 11.—While standing under a shed attached to the barn, two sons of George Eisenbach, 14th concession, Hay Township, were struck by lightning about 7 o'clock Saturday night while a severe thunderstorm was in progress. Arthur was instantly killed, his brother may recover. One Dead; One May Die. Watford, June 11.—The house of John Maddock, three miles from Inwood, was struck by lightning on Friday evening. Mrs. Maddock and her daughter Minnie, 21 years of age, were in the cellar at the time. Miss Maddock was instantly killed, and her mother so severely shocked that she may not recover. Killed in Doorway. St. Williams, June 11.—Thomas Carr, 21 years of age, son of Lilman Carr, on the 7th concession of Walsingham, was instantly killed by lightning about 8 o'clock Friday afternoon while standing in the doorway of his house. His mother, who was a few feet from him in the yard, was severely stunned and is still in a dazed condition.	A respected resident passed away Friday in the death of Mrs. George Grigg, Victoria avenue. Although she had been ailing for a couple of months, the death came as an unexpected shock, as she had spoken just a short time ago of visiting her daughter in Detroit next week. The deceased was 66 years of age and had been a resident of Chatham for the past 35 years. Besides her bereaved husband, three children are left to mourn her loss, Annie and Henry at home, and Mrs. Fred Maynard of Detroit. The funeral took place to Maple Leaf Cemetery at two o'clock Sunday.	Consigned to Sheriff Jas. D. Burns the body of William Thomas Charbonneau, a sailor in the American navy, arrived at the Union station this morning, shipped from the Mare Island Naval Hospital, off Vallejo, Cal. The deputies at the gaol were puzzled when first notified of the arrival of the body, but Sheriff Burns cleared the mystery by stating that the United States Government refused to ship the body into Canada, and as Charbonneau lived in Chatham, Ont., the sheriff had consented to be the consignee at Detroit, after which the body will be shipped to Charbonneau's sister, Mrs. Lindsay, in Chatham—Detroit News.
