The Woman Wage Worker.

In the closing article of a thoughtful series on the condition of the woman wage-worker in Canada, published in the Canadian Courier, Miss Marjorie MacMarchy makes a strong plea for careful inquiry by competent investigators as to the number of women wage-workers in Canada who do not obtain a living wage, and as to what proportion of them have not the social and financial advantages of home life. It is recognized that the woman who lives at home can exist upon an even obtain many comforts with a wage that condemns her homeless sister to constant struggle. If effective steps are to be taken in the cities and industrial centres to improve the economic and social condition of the woman workers who have no homes it is absolutely essential that their numbers should be learned and something about their wages.
 It may be taken for granted that the woman who does not live at home and who earns less than \$300 a year is in constant peril as to both health and morals. She can neither keep her body properly nourished and clad, nor her mind stimulated and amused by contact with others in places of public resort. 'A good time' to an unguarded woman in the lower wage-earning strata must too often mean chance acquaintance on the street and the acceptance of social favors from men whom she can never invite to her boarding house, because there is no accommodation in it for entertainment.
 The only real remedy for this, Miss MacMarchy points out, is to make the working woman so efficient that she will be able to command wages high enough to permit of a higher standard of living than is now possible. The problem is one that society cannot solve once for all. It is a recurring problem. Miss MacMarchy points out the basic element in these words—"It may be said that the average wage-earning girl marries in a few years, and then her difficulties as a wage-earner are over. There are numerous exceptions to this rule. In any case if a girl is an inefficient and underpaid wage-earner she is not likely to become an efficient and successful housewife. The girl wage-earner is always in our cities and all ways will be. It is, of course, a rural problem also, since girls come to towns and cities from the country to work. What difference does it make that the problem is not for the same girl, but for another? The average girl who works for a living reaches a low standard of efficiency and a low level of wages. If she marries, her successor inevitably appears and inherits the same problem."
 There is work of the greatest national importance to be done in the raising of the status of the Canadian working girl, by making her efficient not at the end of her period in the ranks of commerce and industry, but at her entrance. This means a very great change in educational methods. Technical training for female workers is bound to come to the front in a city like Toronto, where not less than forty-five thousand girls and women are daily toiling in offices, shops and factories.—Globe.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the District Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior. Father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of intending homesteader.
 Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
 In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead of pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent), and cultivate fifty acres extra.
 A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a quarter-section in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

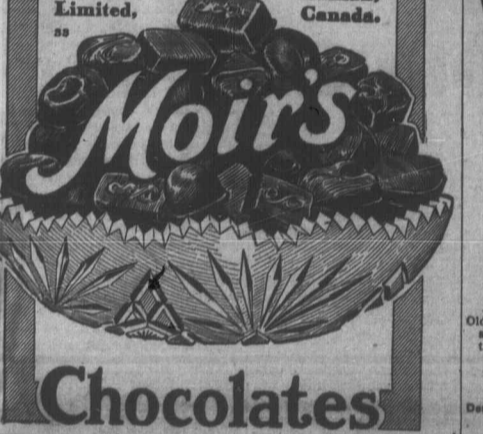

KAISER LOSES SUIT

Lessee of Royal Estate Refuses to Have a House Built For Him
 The Supreme Court at Leipzig, Germany, decided, against the Emperor in a singular suit brought by His Majesty against Herr Sohst, who is the lessee of an estate forming part of the Imperial property at Cullmen. The Emperor desired to build a suitable dwelling house for Herr Sohst on the 43 lots.
 Herr Sohst had originally demanded such a house for himself and plans for the erection of the building costing \$7,000 were prepared. But no definite agreement was reached, and finally the Emperor brought an action against Herr Sohst, who changed his standpoint and asserted he had the right to claim the house, but was not obliged to permit the Emperor to build one against his will.
 The Emperor contended that Herr Sohst must have a house and must tender certain assistance towards the building of it. The first trial of the case was decided in favor of the Emperor, but the Court of Appeal pronounced in favor of Herr Sohst, who has now carried his point in the Supreme Court.

 Where People Live Long
 The village of Orford (Suffolk), with a population of 110, has twenty-four inhabitants averaging eighty-four years of age, and in addition, seventy-six persons over seventy.
 Gift to Mayor and Mayoress
 The ladies of North Shields have presented the mayor of that town (Mr. Isaac Black) with a new set of robes, and the mayoress with a chain of office, to be handed on to her successors.
 Burglars as Oligarches
 "We have enjoyed ourselves greatly," the oligarchs were grandly, with the message left behind by burglars who broke into the house of Mr. Reid, of Cloughburn, near Dumfries.
 Children's Careers
 Middlesex Education Committee is taking steps to advise children about to leave school with regard to their future careers and registration is to be kept by the divisional clerk in each district.
 Luring Gunmakers to London
 Mr. W. C. Powell, at a meeting of Birmingham gunmakers, complained that London gunmakers were tempting youths educated at the expense of the Birmingham gun trade to leave Birmingham.
 Do Ottars Live on Fish?
 Major Spencer Ferguson, speaking with a long experience of angling at a meeting of the Ontario Otter Hunt, combated the theory that otters live largely on fish. He said he had only twice seen a fish taken by an otter.
 Captain G. A. Broad, R.M., N.Y.O., has been appointed Keeper of the Cottage, Virginia Water, Windsor Park, in place of the late Mr. David Welch, N.Y., who had charge of the house in which the Royal children were taught seamanship.
 Wagtail's Nest on Railway Spring
 As a market train arrived at Salisbury from Market Weighton, a surprising discovery was made of a wagtail's nest, containing five eggs, on the top of the spring and the bridge of the luggage van. The nest was not disturbed.
 Old Country Mansion Burnt Down
 Handham Priory, near Poulton, a fine old mansion dating from the thirteenth century, was destroyed by fire. Mr. J. D. Ayl and his family and servants escaping the flames in their attire. The fire is attributed to the overheating of an oak beam in the kitchen.
 To Harness the Trent
 Nottingham City Council has decided to take expert advice as to the possibility of using water power from the Colwick and Beaton Weirs in the Trent, for generating electricity.
 Old Oak Bridge Demised
 Built in 1759, the Broad bridge, Dunmow, is marked for demolition. A massive structure in oak, the upper part is still in good condition, but supports have been undermined. A bridge of iron and concrete will take its place.
 Wasted Old Age Pension
 Christiana Crump, an old age pensioner, who was stated to have spent her pension in drink and wine, was housed over at Scarborough, charged with attempting to commit suicide by trying to drown herself in the sea.
 Strange Funeral Incident
 While a funeral was passing to Glenarriff Cemetery, Ireland, a horse bolted suddenly and, being taken from the hearse, when it fell on the footpath with straps. After some delay the funeral procession proceeded to the cemetery.
 Big Castle "Driver"
 A "driver" is reported of 300 head of cattle from lands at Ballygowan, in the Tipperary district, property of Sir Gilbert King, but which have been in the hands of the Estates Commissioners for a considerable time. The cattle were recovered and the police force in the district has been increased.
 Certainty of Steam Navigation
 In connection with the celebration of the centenary of the inauguration of steam navigation, the Corporation of Glasgow have notified a six-month exhibition to be held at the Victoria Museum, illustrating the history and development of the application of steam to marine propulsion.
 The Red Beard
 At Dundee David Brodie, 22nd of age, a fish dealer's assistant, was sentenced by Sheriff Mackay to receive twelve months with the hard labour for the theft of a silver watch and a gold watch-chain and seal from a house in Fisher street, throughly Ferry. The sheriff said Brodie should have got a good thrashing long ago.
 Dog Story
 At Llangrove, Wales, a farmer, while driving along to Llangrove, had lost his mother, which he drove into a hedge into an adjoining field. The mother dog tried to draw the attention of his long, but failed. Immediately the sheep were badly driven into a field the dog rushed back to where the mother had settled, and there lay down beside it.
