TRUTH A FACTOR IN WINNING THE WAR

On Tuesday evening, Nov. 16, Dr. J. H. MacDonald will deliver a lecture in the auditorium of the Baptist church on the subject, "Truth a Factor in Winning the War". A silver collection will be taken up.

The lecture will illustrate the victorious power of truth by telling of the activity of the British Ministry of Information in impregnating during the last year of the war the minds of the people of alien countries with correct ideas of the war-aims and achievements of the entente powers. It was the policy of the German War Lords to keep the essential facts from the people, military and civilian, and to give them false and misleading information. How to devise means to enlighten the citizens of Germany, Austria-Hungary and Bulgaria and to get the truth into their hands so that they might read it and think of it for themselves, required consummate initiative and skill. The lecturer will show how this was done and how truth when it was brought home to these peoples, broke down their morale and caused them to distrust their leaders, thus proving a powerful weapon in winning the war.
