The ceremony of baptism by immersion was celebrated in western Texas the other day, and when the fourteen candidates walked down to the water fifteen revolvers were deposited on the bank of the stream, that of the preacher making the fifteenth.

The numbers of fires that took place in Paris during the past year was 2,754. Twenty of them were caused by accident, 2,800 by imprudence or negligence, and 200 by defects of buildings.

The medical faculty of the university of Zurich have conferred the degree of doctor on Fraulen Drava Spicic, a young lady from Servia, and Countess Vilna Hugi, a young lady from Hungary, both of whom passed successful examinations and delivered inaugural dissertations of exceptional merit.

The Revolution Francaise has been fined 2,000 francs for printing articles by the escaped political convicts, Jules Valles and Arthur Arnould, in the substance of the articles were not given into the sole offices charged with the execution of a decree of 1852, prohibiting the publication of writings by persons under sentence for certain crimes.

Circular Letter from His Lordship Bishop Grinnon to the Catholic Societies of the Diocese of Hamilton.

GENTLEMEN.—The national feast of Ireland's patron Saint is near at hand, and Irishmen and their descendants rejoice at this event all the world over, for their lot is cast in all nations. The conversion of Ireland from Paganism to Christianity is the most remarkable event in ecclesiastical history. St. Patrick was sent to our nation by Pope St. Celestine in the year 432, and during his missionary life he had the great consolation to see the entire nation converted to christianity, and that without the shedding of a drop of human blood.

This is an event unparalleled in the history of christianity, and speaks eloquently for the advanced state of civilization among the Pagan Irish. When their priests and learned men heard the apostle preaching the new doctrine they argued with him, but when convinced they embraced the Christian faith.

Now, gentlemen, the feast of St. Patrick brings to our mind these glorious memories of yore, and I hope the day will never come when our Irishmen will neglect to commemorate these glorious events of our past history.

Nothing can exceed the popularity of the German Emperor. He has hardly entered any theatre without the audience rising to their feet to hurl and chant the national hymn: and such is the ceaseless stream of gifts kept pouring into the palace by his attentive subjects, that the aged monarch has at last been compelled to limit the public of a half-forgotten order in council forbidding the presentation of books, music, objects of art and industry, etc., without leave being previously asked for and obtained.

The widow and executors of M. Thiers having come to the conclusion that the publication of his political speeches would prove a monument to his memory, lost no time in settling about it, and the first three volumes will soon be published.

From recent statistics it appears that there are no fewer than 1,100 daily, weekly, and monthly journals published in the French capital. Of these, 71 are devoted to religion, 104 to jurisprudence and administration, 153 to commerce and finance, 25 to geography and history, 159 to recreation, 35 to instruction, 40 to literature, and 10 to fine arts, 4 to photography, 8 to architecture, 15 to music, 17 to the stage, 70 to fashions, 134 to industry, 80 to medicine, 48 to science, 29 to the army and navy, 38 to agriculture, and 23 to sport.
