MARKETS AND FINANCE

Tuesday, Dec. 10.—Central market was rather dead this morning, on account of the heavy roads, many farmers staying at home. Pork was rather scarce, and it was backed up a few cents higher, while hogs advanced 25c. a hundred.

Receipts of live stock at the yards were 90 car loads, composed of 1,562 cattle, 7 hogs, 2,370 sheep and 48 calves. The quality was the best seen on any market since one year ago.

Butchers—Prime picked lots of Christmas cattle sold at from \$5.25 to \$5.75, and in two or three instances at as high as \$6.87 and even \$8 per cwt. was quoted, but only one, two and three-cattle lots brought the high quotations.

Feeder and Stockers—Good loads of Christmas heifers sold at from \$4.75 to \$5.25; medium to good, \$4.50 to \$4.75; common, \$3.50 to \$4.25; cows, \$2.50 to \$3.50; canners, \$1 to \$1.50 per cwt.

Milkers and Springers—A limited number of calves, \$35 each. Veal calves—Prices for veal calves ranged at from \$4 to \$7 per cwt. Sheep and Lambs—Export sheep sold at \$3.75 to \$4 per cwt.; lambs at \$4.50 to \$5.25 per cwt.

Hogs—Gunn's, Limited, reported the hog prices 25c per cwt. higher; select, \$5.25; red and watered, and \$5 f.o.b. cars at country points. (Yesterday's New York Herald.)

Montreal—About 2,041 head of butchers' cattle, 405 calves, 1,045 sheep and lambs, and 856 fat hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles Yards, this afternoon. Prime hogs sold at 4-1/4 to a little over 4-1/2 per lb., but they were not choice; pretty good cattle sold at 3-1/4 to a little over 4c; common stock, 1-1/2 to 3c per lb. Calves sold at 2-1/2 to 3-1/2 per lb. for grass-fed, and 3-1/2 to 4c for good veals.

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Stocks and Bonds

NOON STOCK LETTER. (Received by A. E. Carpenter from Ennis & Stoppam.) New York, Dec. 10.—The market during the morning developed weakness in various issues. Selling of Reading, A. R. and A. C. P. was of influential character, and of very fair quality in St. Paul and Southern Pacific. Interests recently prominent on the bear side were conspicuous sellers of Great Northern and the trading element was disposed to operate for a further recession in prices.

Increased loss of the banks to the Sub-Treasury, and reduction of wages in certain directions by the Steel corporation were collateral influences. More important, however, is possibility of bank liquidation of stocks to assist in retirement of clearing house certificates, and the recent omission of usual dividends by 30 corporations to the extent of over \$11,000,000 in all, thus tending to shift attention to bonds where interest may be fairly regarded as safe. It is said that, based on reduced output of Anaconda, cost of production of copper by that company is close to 11-1/4 cents. It is figured that N. Y. C. will at the end of the year be able to show some \$1,600,000 surplus over regular dividends.

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DISCUSSED THE NAVY QUESTION.

INTERESTING DEBATE AT THE CANADIAN CLUB MEETING. Quite a Variety of Opinions Expressed by the Members—Hon. Adam Beck Coming for Next Luncheon.

Mr. W. M. McClement presided at the Canadian Club meeting in the Conservatory of Music last evening, at which an interesting debate was held upon the question taken up by Frank Hodgins, K. C., at the last luncheon as to whether Canada should contribute to the Imperial navy or build a navy of her own. The subject was discussed from the point of view of everyone present, and one absent member sent in his views with a request to the President to read them.

Bank of British North America, gave his views from the standpoint of an old country man upon whom the cost of running a navy devolved, but apart from that he was part and parcel with Canada using all its surplus in the support of citizen soldiers who had something at stake and would not rush into a war for the sake of glory.

Mr. Peter Pennington, of the Bank of British North America, also spoke, and his views were somewhat along the lines of Mr. MacPherson's. Others who spoke were J. R. Marshall, of Stoughton, Ont., and J. Morrison's office; Charles F. Gray, of the Westinghouse; H. Simpson and C. G. Bird, of the Trades and Labor Council; W. R. Dryden, city; the President, Allan Studholme and G. J. Smith.

The President announced that "Power in Ontario" would be the subject for the talk at the next luncheon, December 20, and that Hon. Adam Beck would be the speaker.
