From the harvest of 1900 Canada exported 9,359,640 bushels of wheat, from the 1905 harvest 41,905.937 bushels, and of last year's harvest 45,879,098 bushels. Of oats the exports for the first period totalled 8,106,680 bushels; and for the third 4,829,025 bushels. Exports of barley for the three years were, respec-

barley for the three years were, respec-tively, 2,412,972 bushels, 982,738 bushels and 2,702,154 bushels. and 2,702,154 bushels.

Exports of last year's harvest included ten million bushels of wheat in the shape of flour, making the total for the year about fifty-six million bushels, or about eighteen million bushels less than the total quantity of wheat inspected for sale in the three prairie provinces.

\$1,000,000 PROJECT. Huge Pipe to be Laid Through Queen Victoria Park.

Welland, Ont., Sept. 20.-The Comissioners of Queen Victoria Niagara Falls Park on Saturday gave permission Falls Park on Saturday gave permission for another immense undertaking by the Ontario Power Company. The company will spend over a million dollars in laying another pipe from the gatehouse to the power house. The new pipe is to be the same diameter as the old, eignteen feet, but instead of being steel encased in concrete. will be wholly of reincased in concrete. will be wholly of reincased in concrete. cased in concrete, will be wholly of reinforced concrete. It is anticipated that
the work will be completed in six months,
The long stretch of the park which
the pipe will traverse will be torn up
again, and will resume the appearance of half a dozen years ago, when

MAKING MONEY.

N. Y. Postoffice Officials Inconsiderately Interfered.

New York, Sept. 20 .- Post Office inspectors made an unannounced call today in an east side tenement and arrested Dominico Forte, a young Italian, and the reputed head of the "European-American Transfer Company," a concern through which it is alleged hundreds of Italians throughout the United States were victimized. Forte, charged with using the mails to defraud, was held in \$1,000 bail.

According to the inspectors, letters were sent out by Forte to credulous foreigners, stating that a package of jewelry consigned to them had been received, and that the "European-American Transfer Company," as agent, had paid \$1.95 duty thereon.

The package would be forwarded to its destination, the letter added, upon receipt of \$2.95. The inspectors say that the names of 10,000 prospective "customers" were found in Forte's rooms.
